We, the class of 1948, have finally made our way thru four long years of high school training. It was fun, but oh, how happy we now are to know we have finally completed our job.

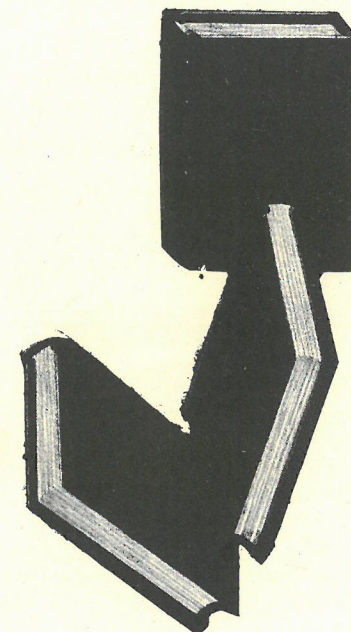

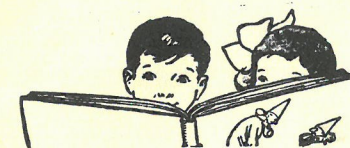
FIRST, SECOND, THIRD GRADES

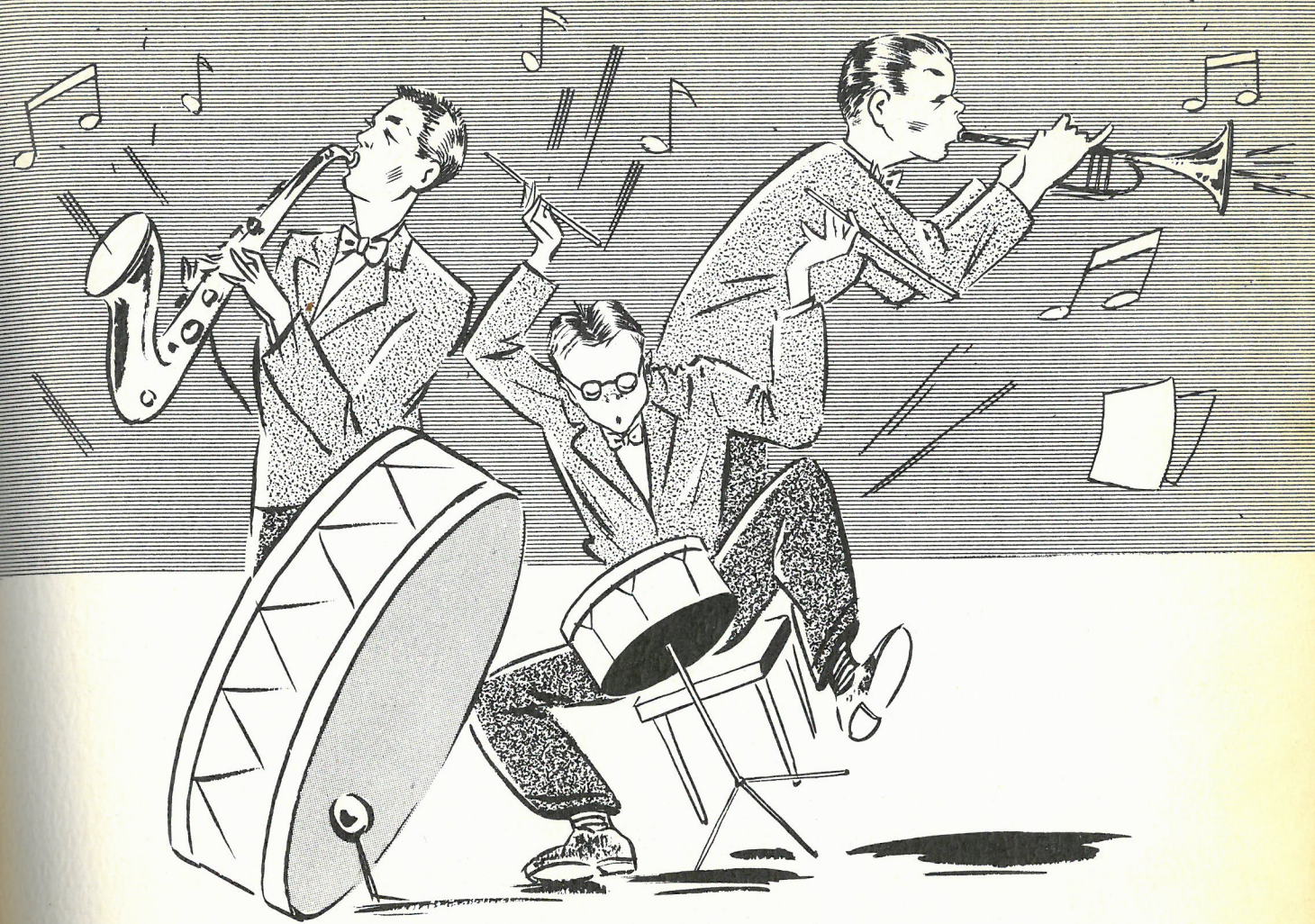


FOURTH, FIFTH, SIXTH GRADES

A C T I V I T I E S

The School Year

THE SCHOOL year, 1947-1948 began on August 25th with some forty students in the high school and over one hundred in the grades making a total of nearly 150 students to open the school year. This enrollment was an increase over the previous year.

Two of the high school teachers of the previous year, Mr. Ellis White and Mr. Samuel Freel, had been reemployed and were on duty at the beginning of the year but the Board of Education was looking for another teacher and superintendent.

Mr. White began classes in general mathematics, world history, algebra, and Missouri history while Mr. Freel had classes in English and government. Both men were filling in with other classes which were later to be conducted by the third teacher.

During the second week of school, Mr. Bennett B. Smith took up the duties of superintendent and also began classes in general science, biology, and bookkeeping. Thus, Chadwick High School was off to a good start for the school year.

In October a carnival was held for two nights in the gymnasium with the assistance of the PTA. This was quite successful financially.

The first semester came to a close almost before many realized it and final examinations and Christmas holidays were upon us.

Christmas programs were held on Tuesday, the 23rd with a program by the grade pupils in the morning followed by a moving picture, "The Enchanted Forest," in color, shown in the afternoon as a gift to the students from the faculty. School closed that evening for the remainder of that week plus a full week vacation following.

The second semester began on January 5th with the return to school following the holiday vacation. Everyone seemed to get into the spirit of school at once and classes moved along in a fine way.

Two instructional motion pictures were given, one by Mr. Barry of the Forestry Service, on conservation, and one by Sgt. Burnam of the State Highway Patrol, on safety.

As the school year moves on, the crowning event will be the Baccalaureate and Commencement exercises for the seniors to be held in April.



SCHOOL Events

In a school the size of Chadwick, it is not always possible to carry on a great number of activities because the time must be taken up with regular school work. But in casting back over the several months, a number of events are noted.

The freshmen were given their initiation the night of September 25th in the gym. This was a pleasant evening for everyone, including the freshmen, and was conducted in a manner that called for no criticism.

Another, and one of the big events of the year was the carnival held on October 17 and 18 in the gym. Both nights brot forth large attendances and the financial return was very good. The school was assisted in this effort by the PTA and the proceeds were divided. Stands for the sale of various articles as well as contests for which the winners were awarded prizes made up two interesting evenings.

Sneak Day was observed on November 7th when nearly all students took the day off for a trip to Springfield. Some remained at school and played various games in the gym, some made a trip to Forsythe, and an extreme few did some studying.

Another high light of the school year was the dinner served at Thanksgiving time by the faithful PTA cooks--Mrs. Loomus and Mrs. Burkhart. They were ably assisted by several students, some to pick chickens, some to help with other work in the kitchen. Everything was done to make the dinner a success and all necessary food items to make a well balanced Thanksgiving dinner were prepared.

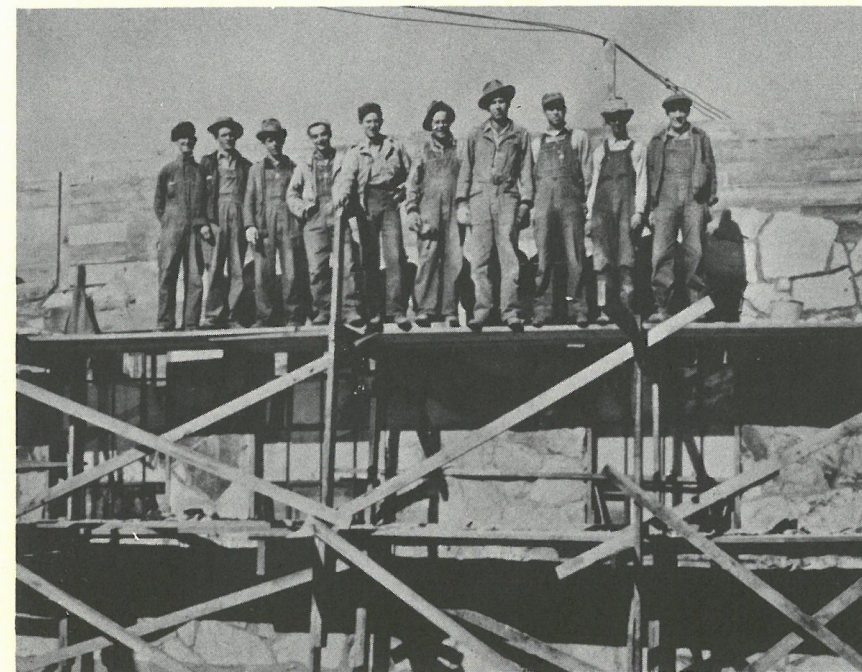

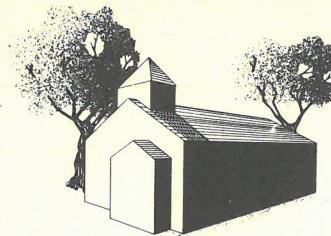
The New Building



Work began on the new building on October 9th when the basement was dug by a bull-doz-er. Forms were placed and concrete for the basement walls poured. Work progressed rapidly under the supervision of Mr. Walter Trent, of Thornfield, until just before Christmas when he returned home to complete some unfinished work.

This addition will be a much needed im-
provement to the school system and will
contain indoor toilets, water supply, and
central heating plant. The building also
allows for one class room and a new super-
intendent's office.

Plans call for the changing of the lunch
room and kitchen to make it more efficient
and allow more room for dining.

PTA

The P. T. A. in Chadwick was organized November 10, 1937. Mrs. Roy J. Bennet, district president, of Springfield, was introduced by Glen Rozelle, then superintendent of the school, and she presided at the meeting. Mrs. Frank Wheeler, state recording secretary, Springfield, gave the object of PTA. Officers elected were: Mrs. Ed. Boles, president, Mrs. John Harris, vice president, Mrs. E. K. Rozelle, secretary, Mrs. Harold Harris, treasurer. There were forty-four members.

In 1939, serving of hot soup to the school children at noon was begun with the mothers donating their services in the preparation. Some vegetables were donated and each child paid 5c to meet other expenses.

Some amusing incidents took place at these noon lunches. One is told of Supt. Lowe who attempted to lend a hand in the cooking and dumped a bag of rice into the soup without precooking. The rice went to the bottom and resulted in burned soup. The superintendent withdrew with the statement that he could not be both a good cook and a good teacher.

At the close of the first year, there remained in the treasury only 55c but there was no indebtedness.

In 1943, the first hot lunch sponsored by the organization was started with Government aid. Two cooks were employed and mothers took turns in helping as a donation. Some of the cooks were Mr. and Mrs. Earl Martin, Vornia Walker, Etta Corwin Lydia Loomis, and Blanche Burkhart.

Equipment was needed and Ed Boles who was president of the board, gave much time in securing this including a large stove.

Many people have contributed toward the success of the lunch program as well as PTA in general. The bus drivers Chas. Donham a few years back, and later Earl Workman; the teachers by helping with programs. Success has come thru the cooperation of parents and teachers and to make a better understanding between the home and the school and a better community in which to live.

Presidents who have served the PTA are: Mrs. Ed. Boles, Mrs. K. B. Rozelle, Mrs. Harold Harris, Mrs. Stanley Brown, Mrs. Earl Martin, Mrs. Hazel Brewer.

May the coming years in the PTA work be even greater than in the past.



COOKS



This book would not be complete without mention of the two faithful PTA cooks who have won a place in the hearts of every student and the life of the school in general with their excellent noon lunches. Ever ready to see that all have plenty to eat, Mrs. Loomis and Mrs. Burkhardt are popular people.



A History of C.H.S.

The first school for Chadwick was a small log building located some distance southeast of the present school. This was only a grade school but carried on for several years.

Later a large frame building was built west of town which served the needs of the community for a number of years until a two story frame building was erected just west of the present stone church on the site of the house now occupied by Mr. Freel.

It was in this building that the first high school classes were held but of only two year level. This was about the year 1921 and classes were conducted by Mrs. Alice E. P. Rassmussen. After two years, school was held in the Baptist church for one year and then a tin building was erected on land east of the present home of Mrs. Walker. This building was later moved to its present location and is now the home of Mrs. Henry Koenig. Clude E. Rhinehart was the superintendent.

Agitation for a new building had begun and was now promoted more extensively. There was much opposition and it was some time before definite steps could be taken. A bond issue of \$8,000 was finally voted and this, with \$2,000 from the State Department of Education was used for the construction of the present grade building.

Four acres of ground were purchased and the old two story building was sold for \$600.

The school board at this time was: C. C. Schupback, J. W. Rozelle, C. W. Mapes with Frank Love as clerk. The board met often and at most any place. When the work was completed and all bills paid \$57 remained in the fund.

Consolidation had started with the coming into the district of Walnut Grove, Barber Creek, and Glendale

schools. These buildings remained and school was held in each of them. Supervision was by the local superintendent who made visits to them. These students were transported and the buildings closed in 1937.

The new building was opened in the fall of 1925 and both grade and high school classes were held there. The high school was made into a four-year school. The first graduating class was presented the next spring of 1926 and consisted of: Glen Rozelle, Paul Adams, Virgil Love, Ted Van Syke, Cleo Holt, Brook-sye Holt, and Mayme Weagley. A. S. Hume was superintendent and Mrs. Sturgeon was a teacher.

The first school busses began operation in 1937 and the fleet consisted of two busses and one car. In 1938 two more were added. In 1940-41 a bus was run to Bradleyville and high school pupils transported here.

The present high school building was built in 1936 and gave much needed space for classes as well as an excellent combination gym and auditorium.

The present addition to the system, the adding of a building to connect the two older buildings, was begun last fall. A bond issue of \$6500 was voted for the purpose of erecting this addition and for the addition of a central heating plant and water system. The building also includes a new office with vault for the keeping of records and an extra class room.

Chadwick Consolidated Schools are now in the best financial condition that has existed for sometime.

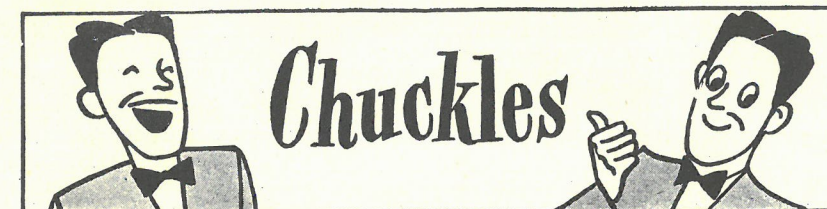
