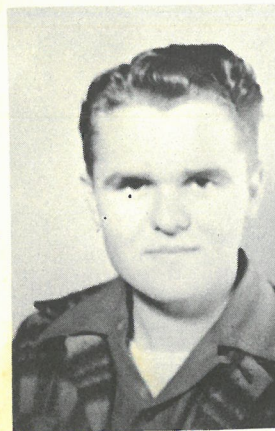

We leave the Sophomores our BELOVED Geometry books.

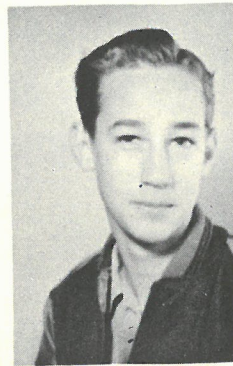

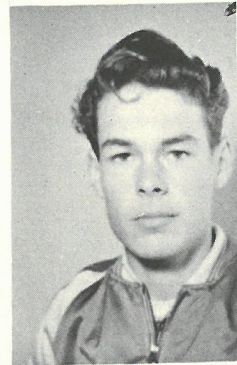
JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

CARNIVAL

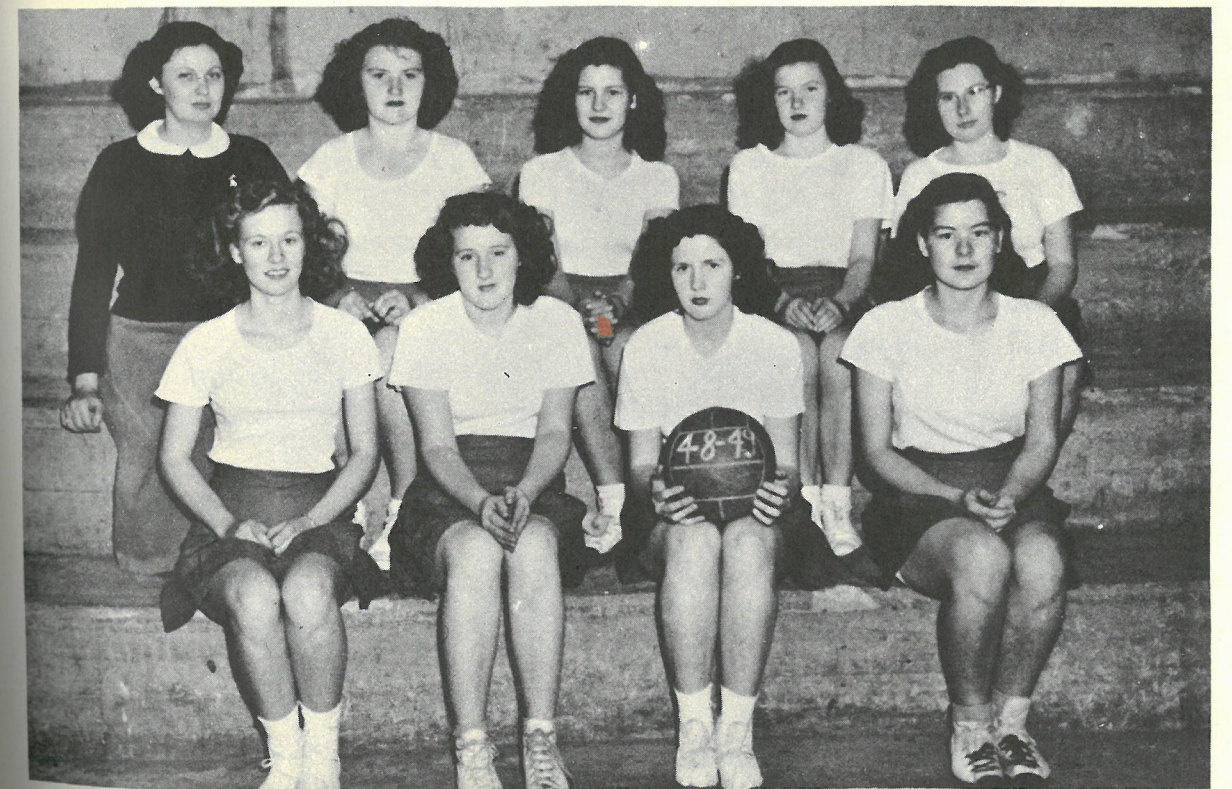
