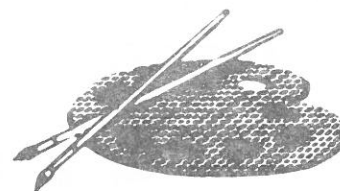

Think about it!

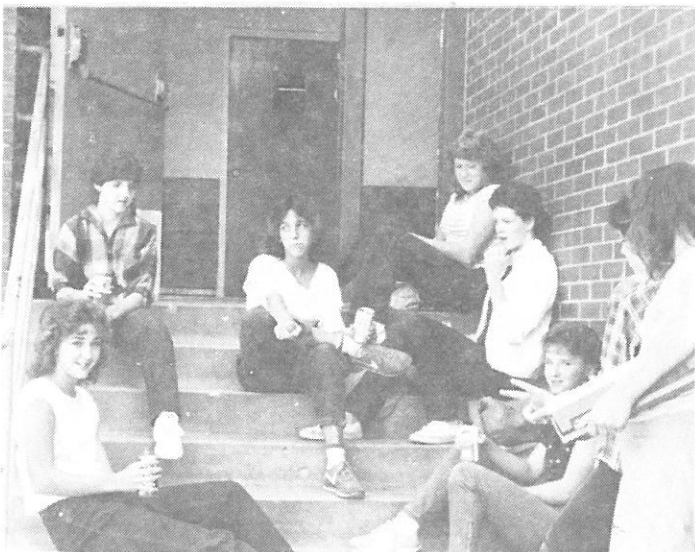
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"HOW'S SCHOOL GOING?"

YOU CAN GO TO COLLEGE!!!

As freshmen, you should decide what you want to do when you graduate. Do you want to work in a general area; a Business Field; or go through college and become a professional person?

While doing some research, I discovered why a lot of students have decided not to go to college. Some people are scared to try something new. As the economy keeps getting worse it is hard to afford to go to college after high school. It takes too much time to get registered and accepted into a college. When your accepted you feel lost; "What classes should be taken?" There is also an argument on, "Well I could be working and making money." Although it takes time and effort, it really isn't that hard. In high school, take the courses you need and then speak to your counselor about the ACT and SAT tests which you need to be considered for your entrance into a college or business school.

The spring of your Junior year, see your counselor again. This time, look up the schools you would like to attend and see if they have a major in your field. After that send a letter requesting an admit application. When you receive your application, fill it out and send it back. If your need help in writing for the application or filling it out, consult your counselor.

Now we will talk about how YOU can afford business school or college. There is state and federal funds available if you know how to get them.

As the cost of education continues to rise it is becoming increasingly necessary for prospective students to seek assistance from federal, corporate, and private concerns. The assistance comes in forms of grants, scholarships, internships, and fellowships that are offered to the student on the basis of need, scholastic ability and special interest.

What are the Five Federal Financial Aid Programs?

1.) Pell Grant: These are awarded to students who need money to pay for their education or training after high school. A Pell Grant is not a loan so you don't have to pay it back. To get a Pell Grant, you must be an Undergraduate who does not already have a Bachelor's degree. You must also go to school at least half time.

2.) Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG): these are also grants, so you don't have to pay them back. To get a SEOG, you must be an undergraduate, who does not already have a Bachelor's degree. Usually you must go to school half time, however some schools award SEOG's to a few students who are less than half time.

3.) College Work-Study (CWS). This is a job that lets you earn money to put toward your school expenses. These jobs are for both undergraduates and graduates. Usually you have to go half time, however some schools award a few students who are less than half time.

4.) National Direct Student Loans (NDSL): These are low interest loans made through your schools financial aid office. You must repay this money. These loans are for both undergraduates and graduates who are going at least half time.

5.) Guaranteed Student Loans: GSL's are low interest loans made to you by a lender, such as a bank, credit union, or savings and loan associations. You must repay this money. GSL's are for both undergraduates and graduates, who are going at least half time.

These are just a few of the hundreds of programs offered. So you see, you can go to college if you want to. All you need is the know how and the WANT TO.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from the guidance office. The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$10.00. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10.00 late handling fee. For 1985-86, ACT has established this test date schedule:

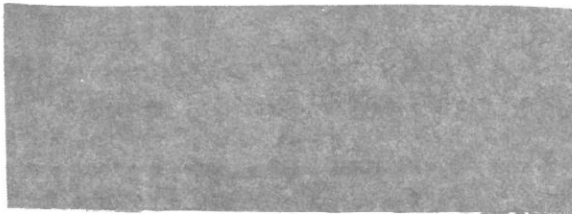
