As Seniors we were a close class. Of course we had our fights but we came out of it being friends. We are going to miss each other a lot, but we will all see each other again.

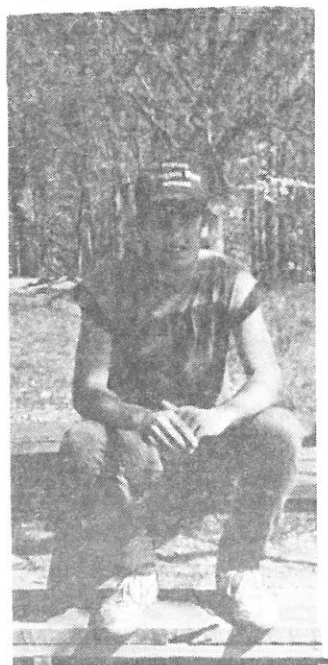
Even with the hustle and bustle of the Senior year, we will never forget the good times we had and made - and time will heal the bad.

LARRY OSBORN - 18

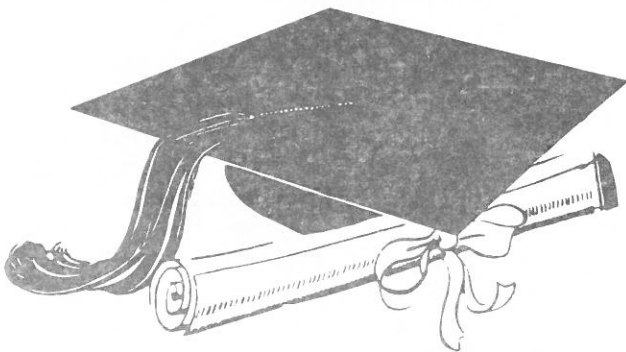

Think a new life has begun.

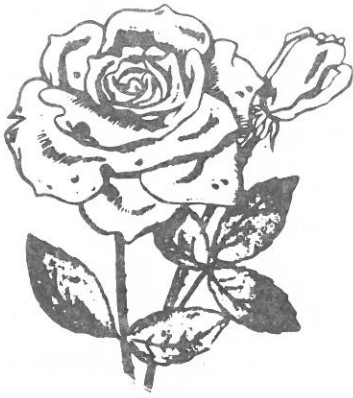

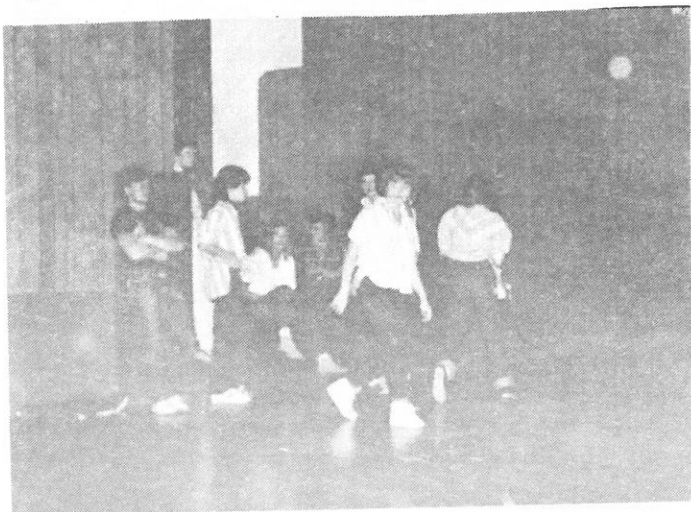
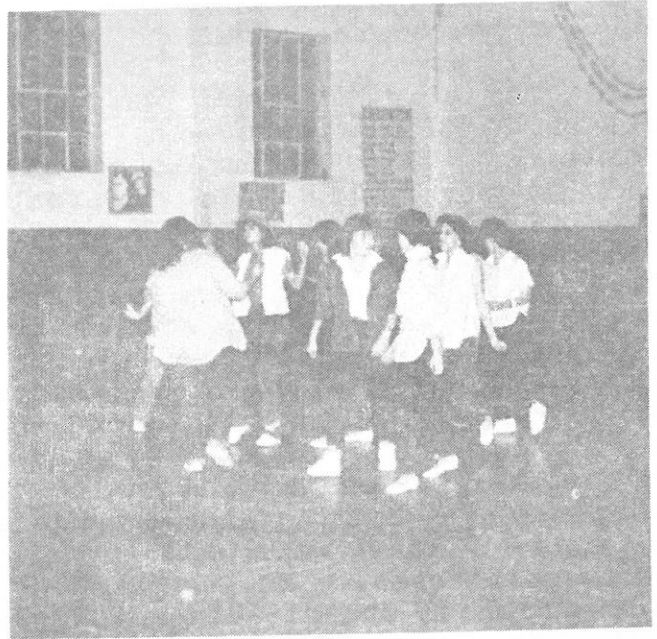
Spring Dance By Lori Harbour

ATHLETIC BANQUET by Laura Coffey

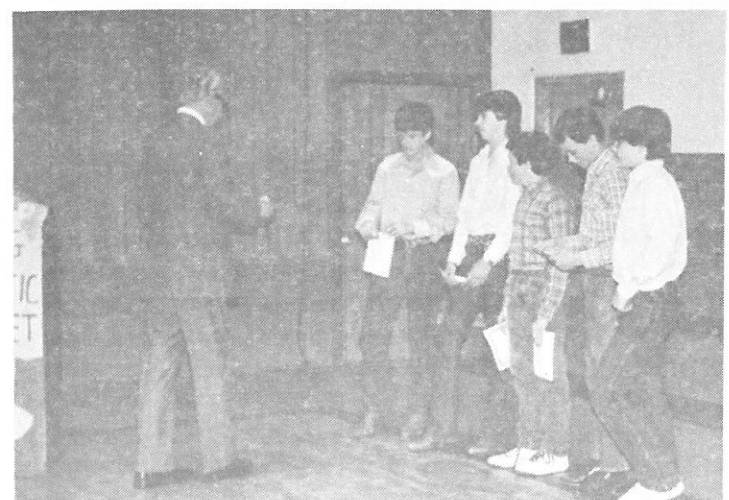
