Anita Maggard and Vickie Stence said the best thing about school was being back with all their friends (I agree). Anita also said the worst was Mutt and Jeff, they never change!


Mike Coffey said being a senior has made this year the best, but the worst was he still has 8 months to go.

OL' SAMMY'S ALL STEAMED UP


If you're ever at the slab and are surprised by a shrill whistle splitting the air, don't worry. It's not a tornado, or World War III, and it isn't even a herd of stampeding wild elephants. It's just that Ol' Sammy's steamed up again.

Born a preacher's son, Samuel Carrick Albert Thompson was born on September 24, 1909. He has one brother and one sister, and he has lived in Missouri all of his life. He served in World War II, and now lives down across the slab from Chadwick -- with his cattle, his cats, and his six steam engines.

Sammy says that ever since he can remember, he's been interested in steam engines. He drew them at school, built models at home, and he remembers getting his first steam engine in January of 1942.

Sammy now has 6 steam engines, three that are whistlers, which are dated 1902, 1905, and 1924. He repairs his own engines, and he attends Steam Engine shows each year.

KEEP PICTURES BEAUTIFUL

I work in the film processing business and over the years have learned a few things about the care of photographs which I think might be of interest to your readers.

Many of my customers have discovered that their treasured pictures of their children, taken as they were growing up, a few short years later have begun to deteriorate at an alarming rate. Most of this is due to poor handling and storage.

Hopefully, the following tips will be helpful in making sure these photographs will be around for the next generation.

First, mount the photograph properly. Use the triangle photo corners for this-never use glue, rubber cement or adhesive tape to put the pictures in an album. Too, only albums with good quality paper should be used-not those with magnetic or self adhesive pages which have plastic covers. These are harmful, causing even faster deterioration of the photos.

Never write on the face of the photograph. If you feel you must identify it in some way, use a soft lead pencil and write lightly on the back of the picture.

Store negatives in a dry, dark place in a separate envelope. Envelopes designed to seal out humidity are available but the negatives should be placed inside them on a day when the humidity is naturally low.

Avoid getting fingerprints on both the photo and the negative. Handle only the edges.

Good luck in your picture taking. Hope these few suggestions help to keep them beautiful.

12 TIPS TO HELP YOUR CHILD SUCCEED IN SCHOOL

1. Start Right Off- Let your child know right from the beginning that his success in school is very important to you and that you expect him to reach his fullest potential.
2. Regular Homework Periods- Designate a specified time slot each night when he is expected to be doing homework. On the average 30 to 60 minutes a night.
3. Meet The Teacher- Ask about the homework policy and tell the teacher any special concerns or problems your child may have.
4. Don't Become A Pawn- If you have a question or complaint, call the teacher. Don't use your child as a sounding board.
5. Value And Praise Work- Praise the papers and projects your children do. What you value, your child will value, too.
6. Build Responsibility- Teach your child responsibility at home and most likely he'll carry it on to school.
7. Control The Television .Set- Expert's studies show that the inferior and inappropriate nature of the programing is destructive to the childs creative processing and their sense of reality.
8. High Expectations- Expect your child to achieve his or her very best. Doing work neatly and correctly is a value that will serve them well in school.
9. Encourage Outside Interests- Every child needs activities beyond school. What ever his interests are encourage him to pursue and channel his energies in this direction.
10. Be Realistic- Assess your childs ability with blunt honesty. Some children are going to be better in academic areas than others. Be mindful "Your childs life is not yours"

11. Working For Money- Having a job or chores to do is an important part of the growing-up process. A child with a job simply feels better about himself.

12. Communicate- A child needs to share the problems and joys of the day through small talk. Often, he will use his parents as a springboard to test his ideas or as a safety net for posing questions.
