Mike said the day he got an A on his grade card.

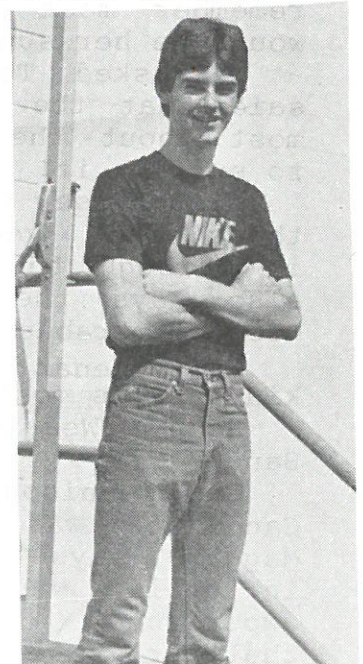
Rick said doing nothing the whole last quarter of school.

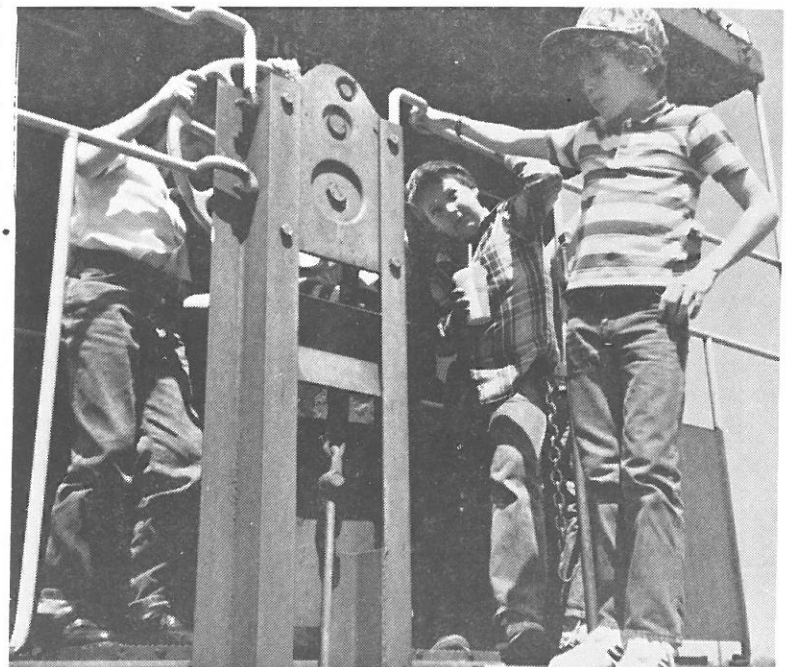
Chadwick Students Visit Christian County Museum

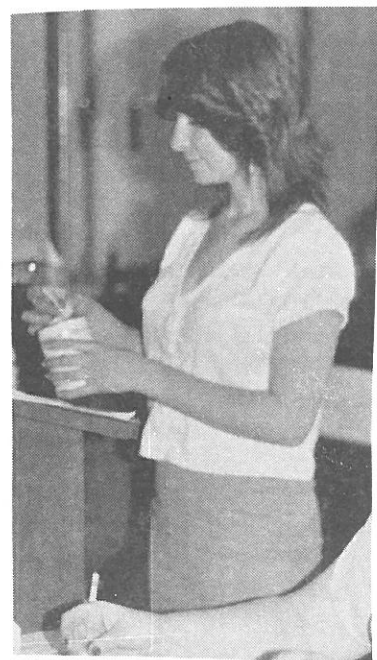

Brown Is Beautiful...Or Is It?

Wouldn't it be wonderful if you could get a gorgeous suntan every summer. You wouldn't have to be embarrassed to wear shorts because you "look like a ghost." You could slip on that new bikini and look fabulous. You could drive the guys wild.

But have you ever stopped to think what effect it might have on you later?

During an interview with Dr. Bruce Pegram of the Smith-Glynn Clinic in Ozark, we learned what kind of damage can be done to your skin from too much sun. The more exposure to the sun you have, the more damage you will get. The damage done to your skin is an accumulation of the sun you have taken in over a number of years. It doesn't happen just all at once. Once you have damaged your skin it is a life long problem. It doesn't go away within a year or two. "This problem begins from the time when you are a little kid running around outside in your diaper until your teenage years when you go wild trying to get a suntan." And it doesn't stop there.

Dr. Pegram says it would be ideal for everyone to remain "fishy white." That way you wouldn't get wrinkles like you do from the sun and you wouldn't get skin cancer from the sun. But in this society people are not socially accepted if they are white. Everyone seems to think that to be socially accepted, you must get a tan. If you think you have to get a tan, you should get only a mild tan. Then protect yourself with sunscreens.

Keep it to a minimum so you can do as little damage as possible to your skin and still be socially accepted. If you get a gorgeous tan every summer-sure it looks nice-but just remember "You're beautiful when you're young - but you're ugly when you're older."

Too much sun causes a hardening

or thickening of the skin. Actinic keratosis which is plaques of thickened skin on the regular skin, is common even at a very young age. The thickening of the skin is what later causes the wrinkling when you get older. As age goes on the thickened plaque will cause your skin to get scaly and will require repeated treatment.

The medicine used to treat this will cause an intense red reaction around the areas where it is being used.

Men get the same effect from the sun as women. The earliest change you see is the increased wrinkling. Men tend to have thicker, more wrinkled skin than women anyway. But they don't seem to care as much. In this society it is accepted for men to have wrinkled skin, where women with wrinkled skin are not accepted.

Is there a safe amount of time you could spend in the sun? You can stay out in the sun for a minimum amount of time without too much damage. That amount of time differs with different skin types. Fair people are more susceptible to skin damage, where darker people have more protection.

It also depends on the time of year. In the spring the sun is not directly overhead so you don't get as much radiation. In the summer you get more direct radiation, so it will be easier to burn. If you are trying to get a tan, you should start out by staying in the sun for only small amounts of time, and slowly build up to the tan you want.

There are two types of a tan. The initial tan, that occurs within a day or so after you have been exposed to the sun, and the delayed tan, which occurs within a week after exposure. The initial tan quickly fades within a week or two, but the delayed tan lasts longer.

What about tanning beds? Tanning beds will damage your skin, but maybe less than the sun. They are not completely safe. They give you a loss of elasticity which gives you wrinkling and thickening of the skin.

There are two types of ultraviolet Radiation you get when you get a tan. Ultraviolet A and Ultraviolet B.

With tanning beds you get Ultraviolet A which gives you more of a delayed tan, not so much redness and swelling, and probably less chance of skin cancer. From the sun you get Ultraviolet A and Ultraviolet B, but mostly Ultraviolet B, which gives you both immediate and delayed tanning, more redness and swelling, and a greater chance of skin cancer. Both give you some damage.

Cancers developed on the skin are determined by a number of factors. One, of course, is the amount of time you are in the sun.

Another major factor of the increase in skin cancer is the fact that the blanket that protected us from radiation from space, the ozone layer, is rapidly thinning. The more the ozone layer, is destroyed, the more Ultraviolet Rays it allows to reach us. In the next 15 years, there will be a marked increase in skin cancer because of increased Ultraviolet Radiation from the sun due to the destruction of the ozone layer.

Swimming Safety

Everyone enjoys swimming during the summer. Although, swimming can be fun, it can also be dangerous. Listed below are some tips to keep swimming a fun and safe sport:

1. Know your own swimming ability and never exceed it.
2. Never swim alone.
3. Never dive into water of unknown depth, and always dive with your arms over your head for protection.
4. Swim at a supervised beach or pool, and obey the rules.
5. Children should be closely supervised around water.

6. Don't swim immediately after heavy meals, when you are overheated, tired, or after strenuous exercise.
7. Do not substitute inflated tubes, air mattresses, or other artificial supports for swimming ability.
