Sleep and Dreams

Do we really need sleep? Is sleep a useless inheritance from prehistoric ancestors or the key to developing our brain power? One-third of our lives is spent in the world of sleep and dreams, and knowbody really knows why.

Each night we go up and down through four sleep stages. Each of the stages have a 90 minute cycle. Within cycle the rapid eye movement or REM stage progressively increases from 10 minutes to as long as 55 minutes by the nights end. You awake during the sixth cycle. Into stage one our brain waves are small and erratic. Descending into stage two, we toss and turn. In step three, our sleep is sounder and the brain waves are much slower. Stage four our deepest sleep, marked by large and slow brain waves, a temperature drop and lower pulse rate. After several minutes in stage four, we go through the stages in reverse. But, instead of waking, we enter REM. Our eyes dart back and forth; brain waves are short and erratic. Pulse rate is irregular and muscles limp, as if paralized. During those stages we go through some odd stages of our own, sleep talking and sleepwalking for instance. Using dreams, researchers are finding that dreams may be more useful than we realized. Studies show that people facing a difficult situation, may dream of what might happen or what has happened in the Your dreams operate in many differnt ways whether your sleepwalking, sleeptalking, or just dreaming. Sleep is far from being an interval of quiet rest, sleep is filled with intense and physical activity.

The longest person that has voluntarily gone without sleep was during a rocking-chair marathon. The woman stayed up for 18 days and 17 hours.

The Sleeping Pill

an international basis, sleeping pills and tranquilizers are the largest single group of prescription drugs sold. Why are sleeping pills so popular? Most people would think the reason for this is that they work. But evidence points in the opposite direction. In one experiment, 20 insomniacs, of whom half were taking no medication at all and half were long-term users of sleeping pills, were observed while sleeping. After several nights, it was found that those who were taking pills slept as poorly as, or worse than, those who were not. Part of this is because regular pill users develop a dependency and then a tolerance for the drug. Then the medication often produces a jitteriness, nervousness, and an inability to fall asleep.

One chemical, L-tryptophan, reduces the length of time it takes to fall asleep and even prolongs total sleep time. It is an amino acid and occurs naturally in certain foods. A very good source is milk-as in a warm glassful taken at

bedtime.

Insomnia

Insomnia is being unable to fall asleep at night, waking too early in the morning, or falling asleep but waking up again and again. People who worry too much or have a hard time relaxing also suffer. This chronic loss of sleep can produce depression, irritability, and a persistent sleepiness.

If someone asks you, "Did you sleep well last night?", what determines your answer? Perhaps you judge the way you slept by how you feel the next morning: cheerful, alert, grouchy, irritable, or perhaps still drowsy. Maybe your answer is colored by memories of how long it took you to fall asleep. Or perhaps fragments of your dreams still linger in your mind.

Scientists have studied sleep in animals and humans for years. They have made some interesting discoveries. For example, they have determined that dogs, cats, and mice do indeed sleep, and dream, which indicates the ability of animals to think and learn. Yet, do birds, reptiles, and insects

sleep?

Practically every living creature pauses in its activities at least once in each 24 hours and seems to rest. Fish rest at the bottom of a lake, or perhaps float unmoving at the surface at night. The ringed snake comes out of its burrow at noon and hunts, returning two hours later to rest for a solid 22 hours. But do they sleep? An observer can watch an animal and note whether it is active or lying quietly, and whether its eyes are open or closed. These factors are important clues, but they are often not enough. Horses and cows, for example, rarely close their eyes, and fish snakes cannot close them. Scientists admit that it is nearly impossible for them to say whether or not a animal sleeps, but are determined to find out.

There is also much research being done in human sleeping habits and how they change as we grow older. An infant may sleep for fourteen to eighteen hours a day. He sleeps, wakes, sleeps and wakes again. Gradually he begins to merge two or three short naps into one long sleep, and adapts to the family's schedule. His need for sleep grad-

ually decreases as he grows older until, as an adult, he sleeps about eight hours each day.

The Chit Chat staff did some research on our own. CHS students, on the average, do not believe they get enough sleep. It takes the average CHS student 30 minutes to fall asleep, and he sleeps from seven to ten hours a day. And most of the students dream 2-3 times a week (and remember it.).

So the next time you're asked the question, "Did you sleep well last night?", remember all the things that may affect your answer, and then, if you still find yourself saying no, maybe you should try to go to bed earlier.

Pee Wee Tournament

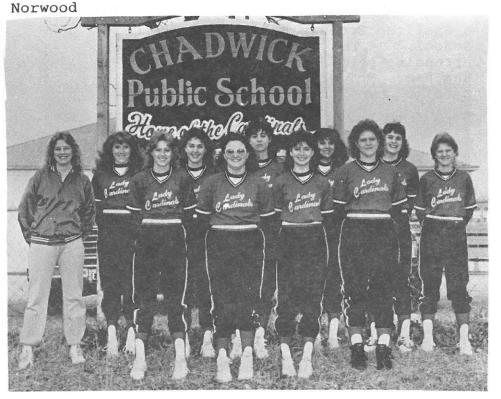
