Too Hot To Handle!

When you hear the word summer, many things come to mind. Swimming, jobs, freedom -- sun tanning. But what can happen if you get too much sun? Here are a few things:

1. **Heat Cramps** -- involve abdominal muscles and limbs. Preceded by profuse perspiration. Direct pressure or warm, wet towels provide relief.
2. **Heat Exhaustion** -- in mild cases, the person feels unusually tired; may have a headache and nausea. In severe cases, perspiration is profuse, weakness extreme, skin pale and clammy. Temperature is approximately normal. Vomiting may occur, unconsciousness is rare. Bed rest, salt water ($\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. for every $\frac{1}{2}$ glass of water) every 15 minutes for three or four doses will help. Get medical attention immediately.
3. **Heat Stroke** -- most likely in elderly people. May occur on hot days in such mild activity as a walk. Usual evidences are headaches, dry skin, and rapid pulse. May be dizziness and nausea. Unconsciousness occurs in many severe cases. Temperature is well above normal, often 106° and sometimes above 109° . First Aid: Medical care is urgently needed. While awaiting such attention, bring person indoors, unclothe, and provide bed rest. If he is conscious, give salt water solution (see **heat exhaustion**), as tolerated. Sponge the body freely with alcohol or lukewarm water, to reduce temperature. A pulse rate below 110 per minute is associated with a tolerable temperature. Once this level is reached, caution is necessary. If the temperature starts to rise again, renew the sponging cautiously. Give no stimulants;

administer fluid and salt in small doses when full consciousness is evident. Later, provide covering according to person's comfort.

4. **Sunburn** is caused mainly by ultraviolet rays. A slight overexposure causes tiny blood vessels in the skin to dilate; the skin becomes red. As overexposure increases, tissue injury starts, swelling of the skin occurs, blisters appear, and often fever and headache develop. The most effective prevention lies in limiting the time of initial exposures. The increase of exposure time should be gradual; about one-third of the previous time if sunbaths are taken daily, and $\frac{1}{4}$ or less if exposures are less frequent. Commercial preparations vary in effectiveness. First Aid: For mild sunburn, cold cream or such oils or greases as salad oil or shortening may relieve pain. Wash the hands before applying the material. Medicated creams may cause skin allergies. Butter or oleomargarine should not be applied. A dressing should be prepared if blistering appears. Medical care is needed for extensive and severe cases. The injured area should not be exposed again to the sun until healing is completed.

If you have to be outside for extended periods of time, be sure to drink plenty of fluids, wear a sunscreen, and take periodic rests in the shade.



Tanning Safety

When you are out in the sun or lying in a tanning bed have you ever thought of the harmful things that it is doing to your body?

Of course not, you are more likely to be thinking of getting that dark glowing tan. But the ultraviolet radiation can injure the skin cells in exposed, unprotected areas of the body, and causes wrinkling and premature aging of the skin. Eventually the skins reparative system breaks down and when abnormal cells accumulate at an uncontrollable rate skin cancer results.

Scientists distinguish between two wavelength bands of ultraviolet light A is longer B is shorter UV-B which is both more effective for tanning and the most dangerous to cells and is concentrated at midday within two hours on either side of the solar noon. UV-A falls more evenly throughout the day. Tanning with UV-A is relatively safe-provided one doesn't walk out into the midday sunlight.

Sunscreens are rated according to sun protection factor SPF, on a scale currently ranging from 2 to 23. The Skin Cancer Foundation and many dermatologists, have recommended nothing less than an SPF of 15, especially on the face. Skin types are rated from 1 to 6 according to intensity of sunburn in the first 30-45 minutes of unprotected exposure to the sun following a period of no exposure. In these circumstances skin type 1 always burns easily, never tanning; skin type 2 burns easily but eventually acquires a minimal tan. Skin types 3 and 4 experience minimal to moderate burn and tan fairly well, while types 5 and 6 rarely burn and tan well.

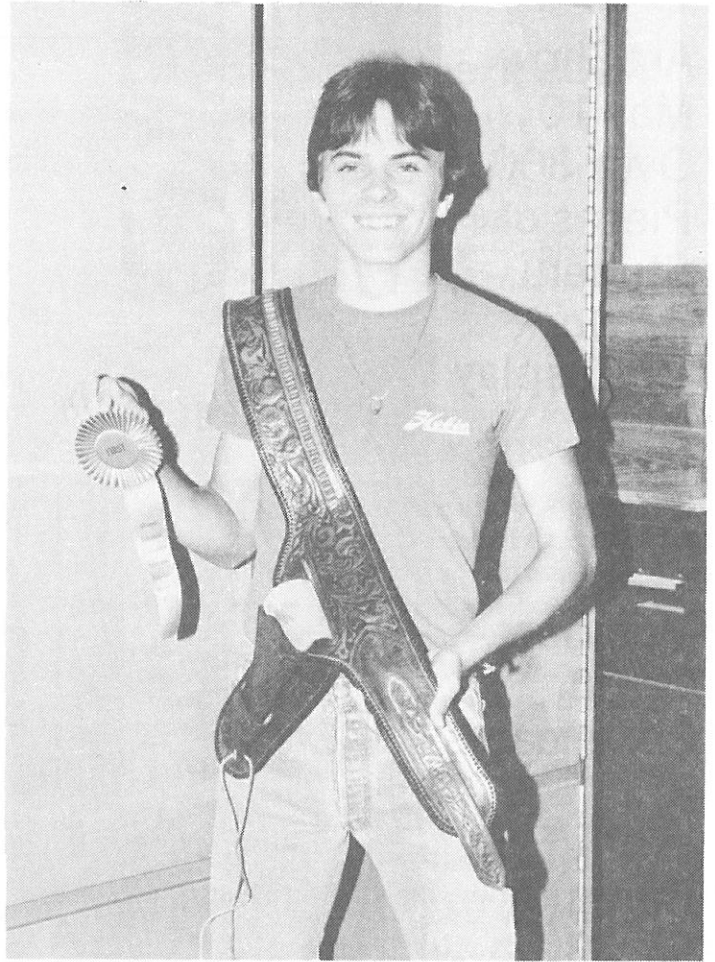

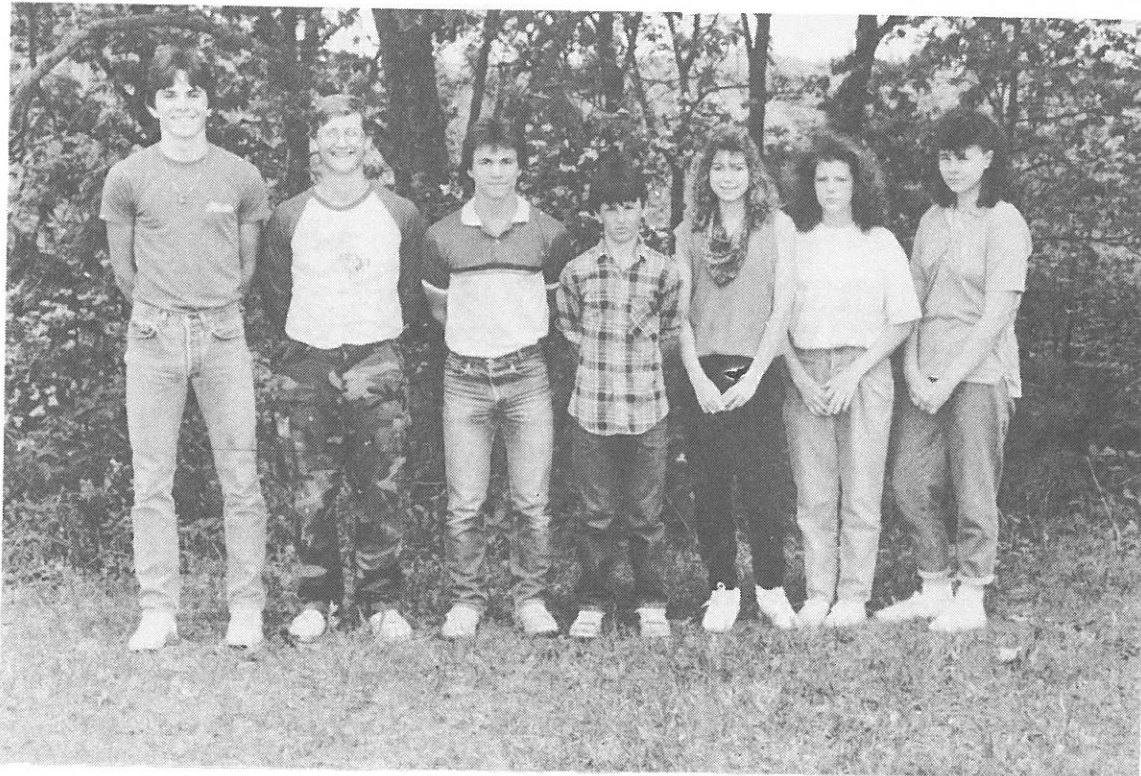
Industrial Arts Earn #1 Ratings

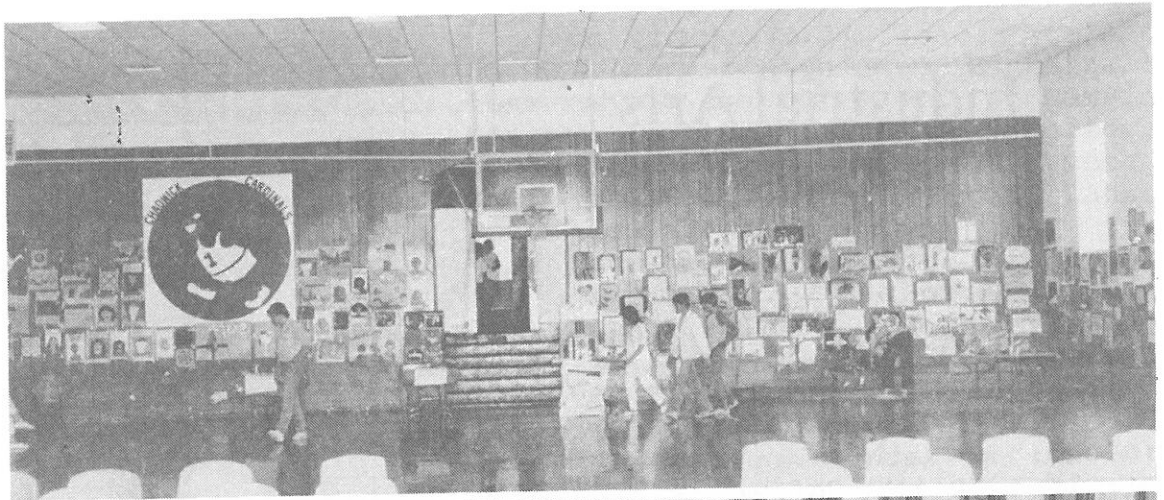
