"Lefties", "Southpaws", some people are treated as if they are not well in the mind because they are left-handed. Parents teachers sometimes try to make lefthanded children write with and use their right hand. This can cause problems like nervousness, stammering. Left-handedness sometimes seems to cause mirror writing (writing from right to left) and reversals in reading, as in reading "was" for "saw". Psychologists have shown beyond a doubt that some people are naturally left-handed and that it is much more difficult for them to do any skillful act with the right rather than the left hand.

If you are left-handed, probably have special writing problems. Your desk may have been planned for right-handers and may be awkward for you. If you learned to place your paper in a position that is normal for right-handers, you probably write with your wrist twisted into a hook above the writing and your hand may be smearing the ink before it dries. Be sure your fingers are at least an inch from the end so that you can see what you are writing. Keep the parts of your hand that touch the paper well below the writing to avoid smudging the wet ink. You may find it easier to write straight up and down or even to slant a bit backward.


Remember that the left-side of the brain controls the right-handed people and the right-side controls us lefties, we are the only ones in our right minds.







On Friday a pep assembly was held to get people in the spirit for our first game. That night a dance was held and everybody had a great time.






