Isn't being in your seventh hour class on a sunny day depressing when you could be outside doing something you like? Ray Tennison seems to think so.


One of the symptoms Gail Cramer suffers is getting restless waiting for summer. For Gail spring fever is worse a month before school is out.






Kim Finney says she hopes she is out of college and making lots of money.


It sounds like the Juniors will still be a very exciting bunch of people even after High School. Good Luck to them all. Keep reaching for the stars!
