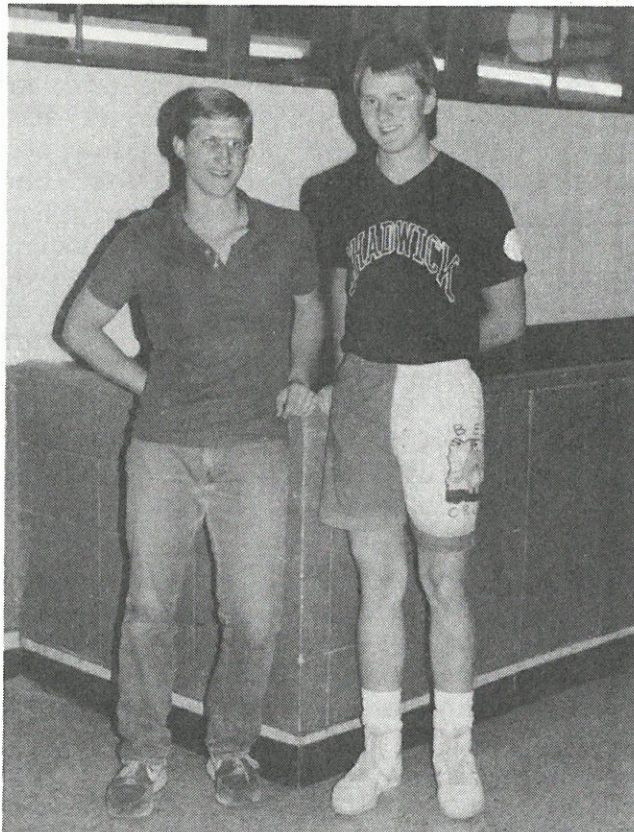

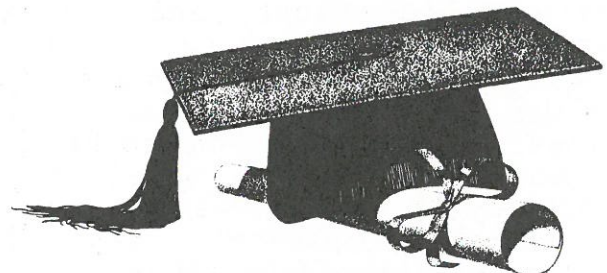

In 1984 Gary Willis entered a leather billfold in the crafts division and received a I.

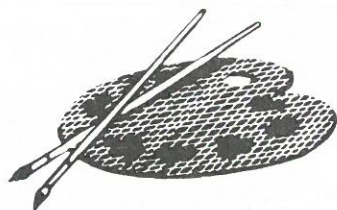

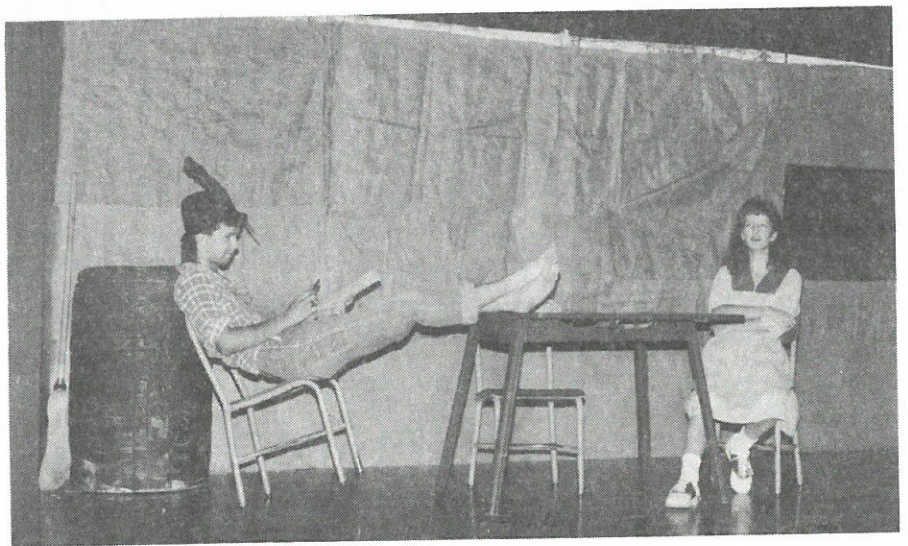
