Do not count calories. Instead, reduce the amount of fat and sugar you eat each day.

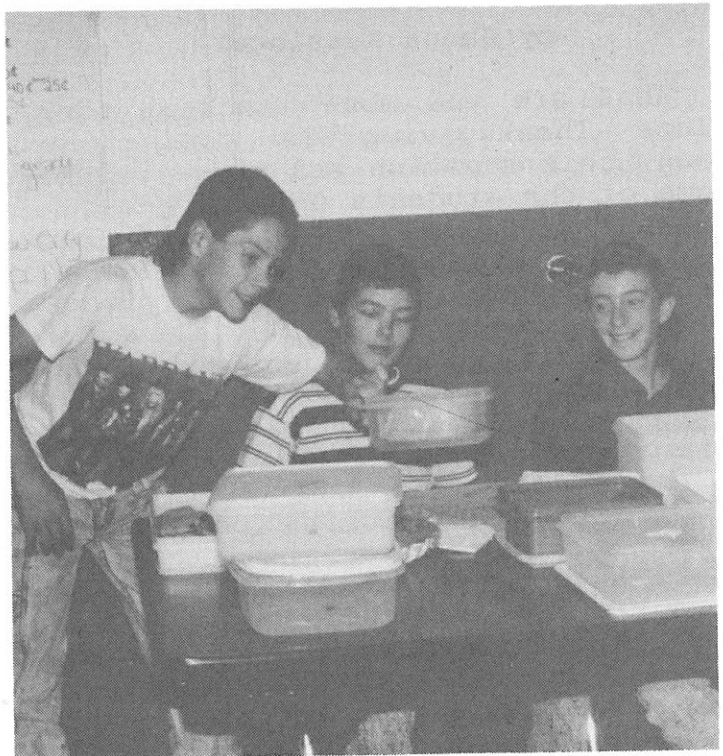
A high protein diet is considered essential in Japan and is derived from low-fat chicken, fish and soybean products.

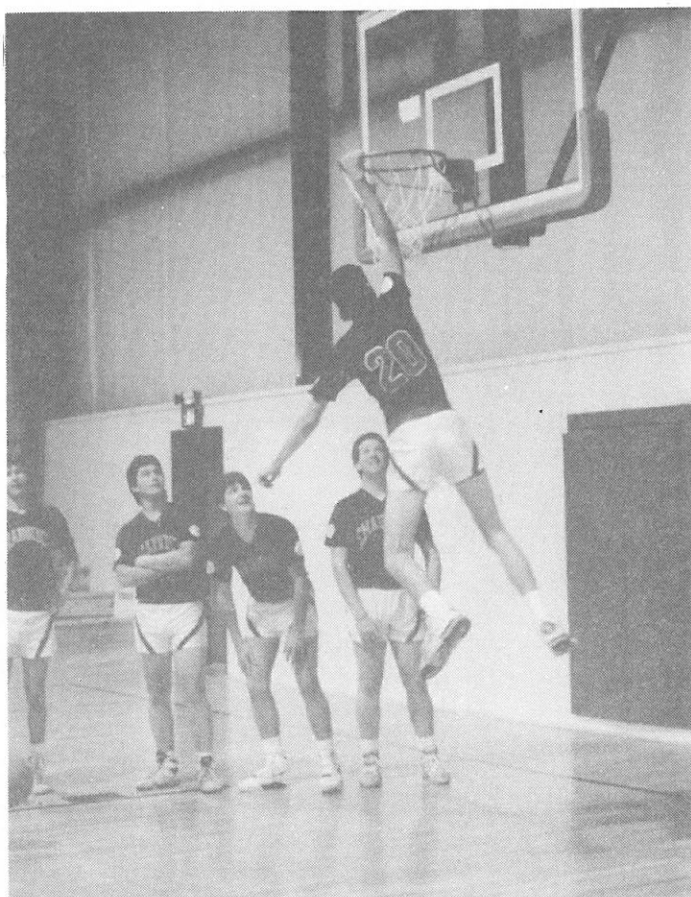

This has been the most amazing game ever seen in the Chadwick Auditorium. It will be a night to remember.



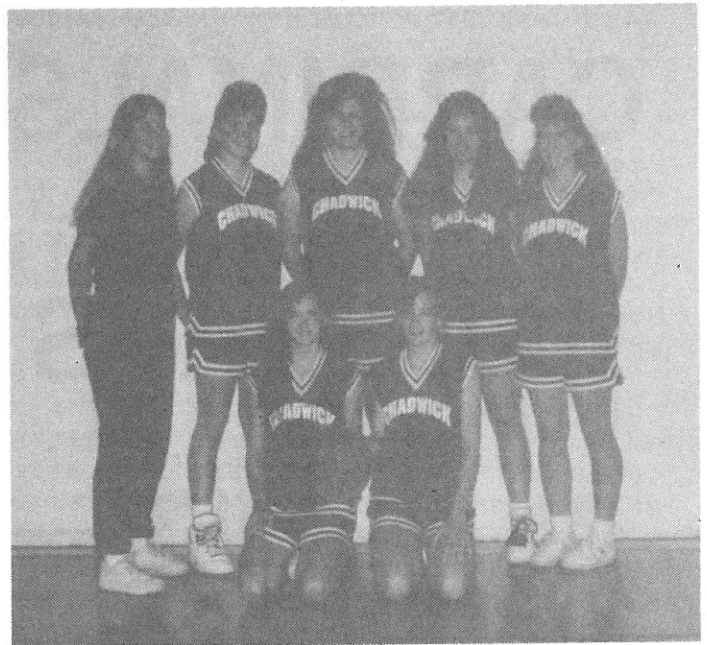

The All-Conference players who are chosen to make the 1st Team are the best athletes in the Conference. The selection is based on their athletic abilities, attitude, and statistics from games.



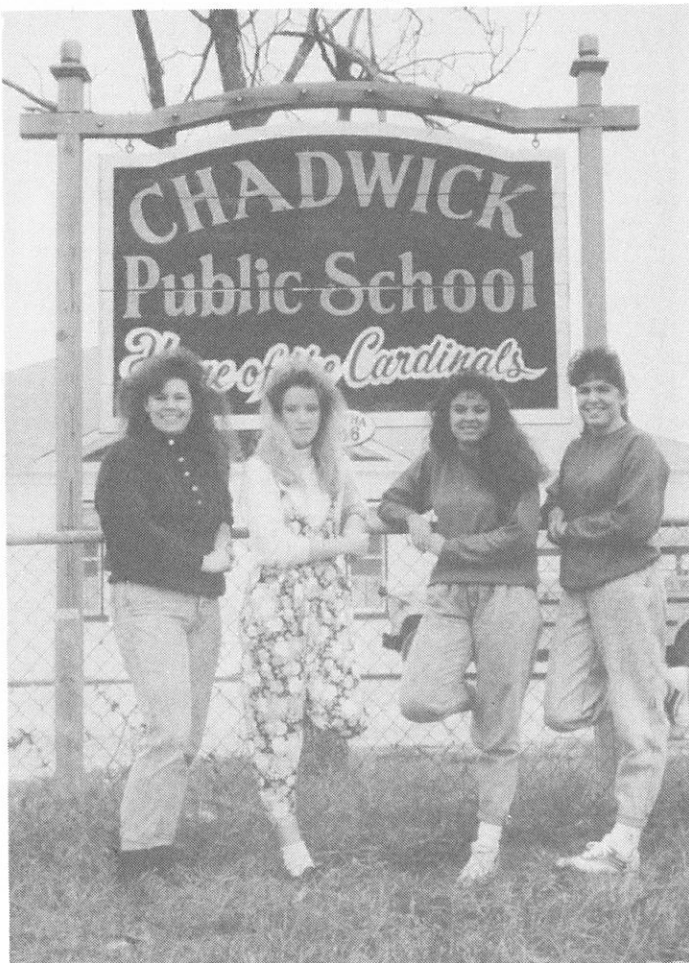
Lady Cardinals

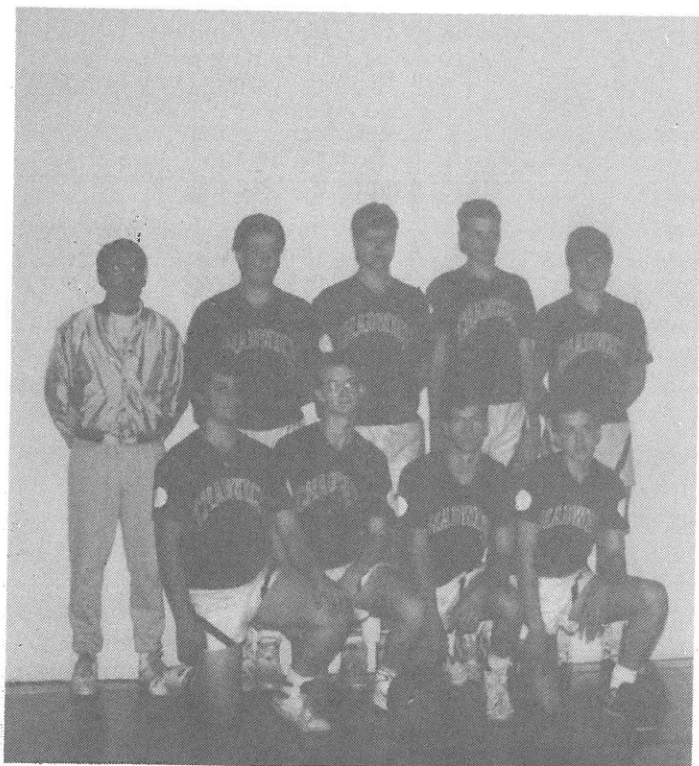

Josh Morrill likes lunch time the most.

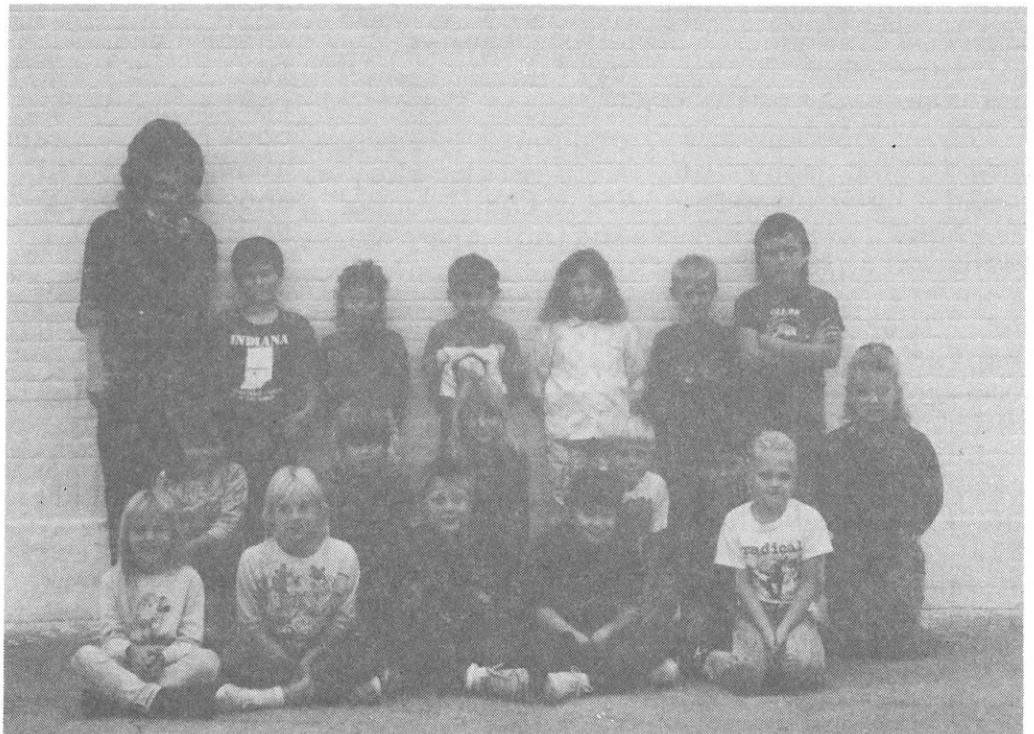
Casey Thomas likes staying busy and having a lot of work to do.

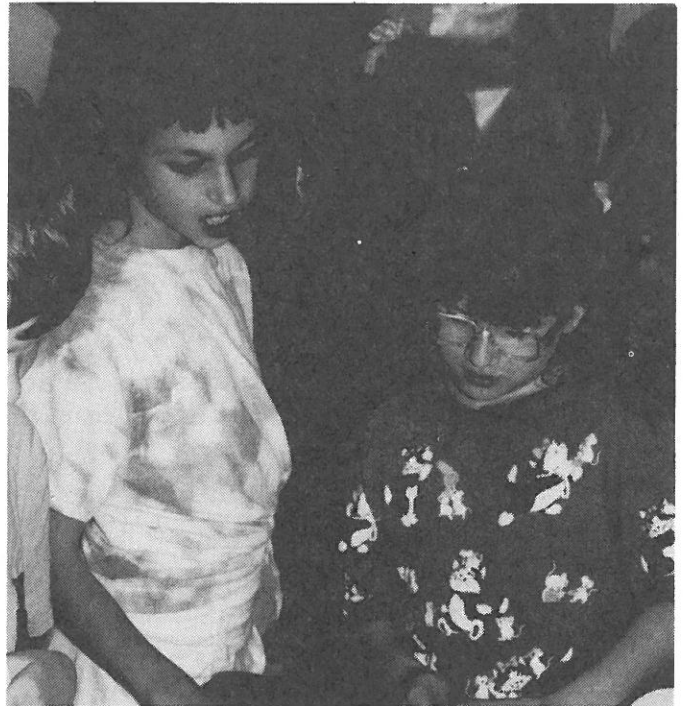
