Coach Arleigh Long received "The Most Secretive Kiss Award." Mrs. Long would not share her story.

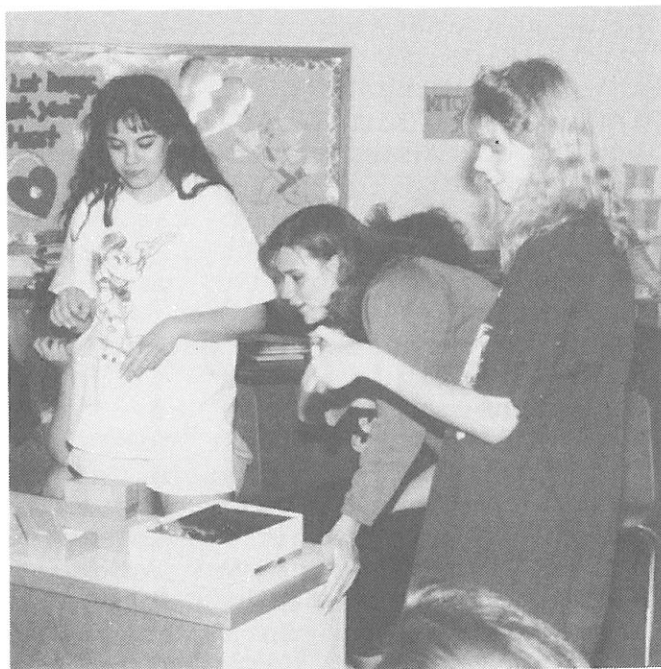
"The Most Traumatic Kiss Award" goes to Karen Cummings. She said that after her first kiss she had to wipe her face dry.

Two Win At FBLA Contest

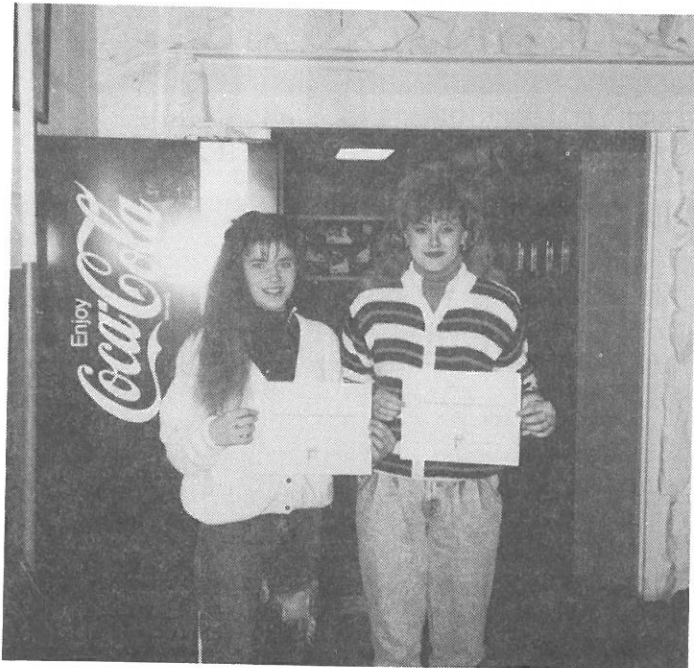

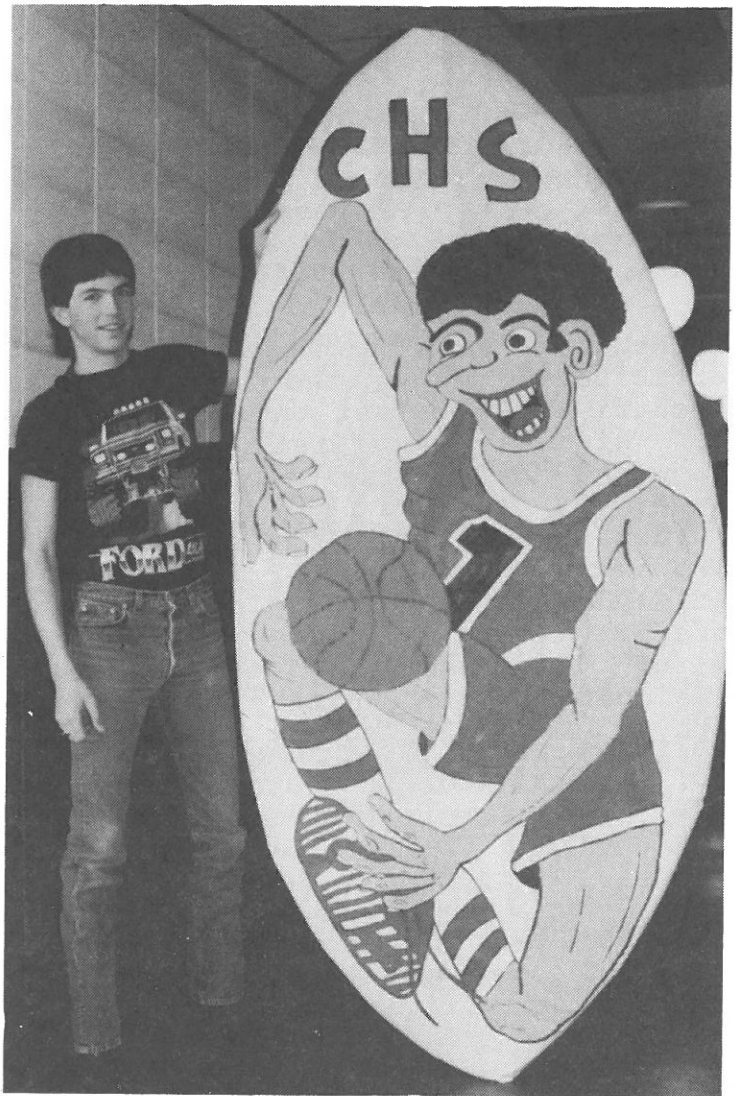

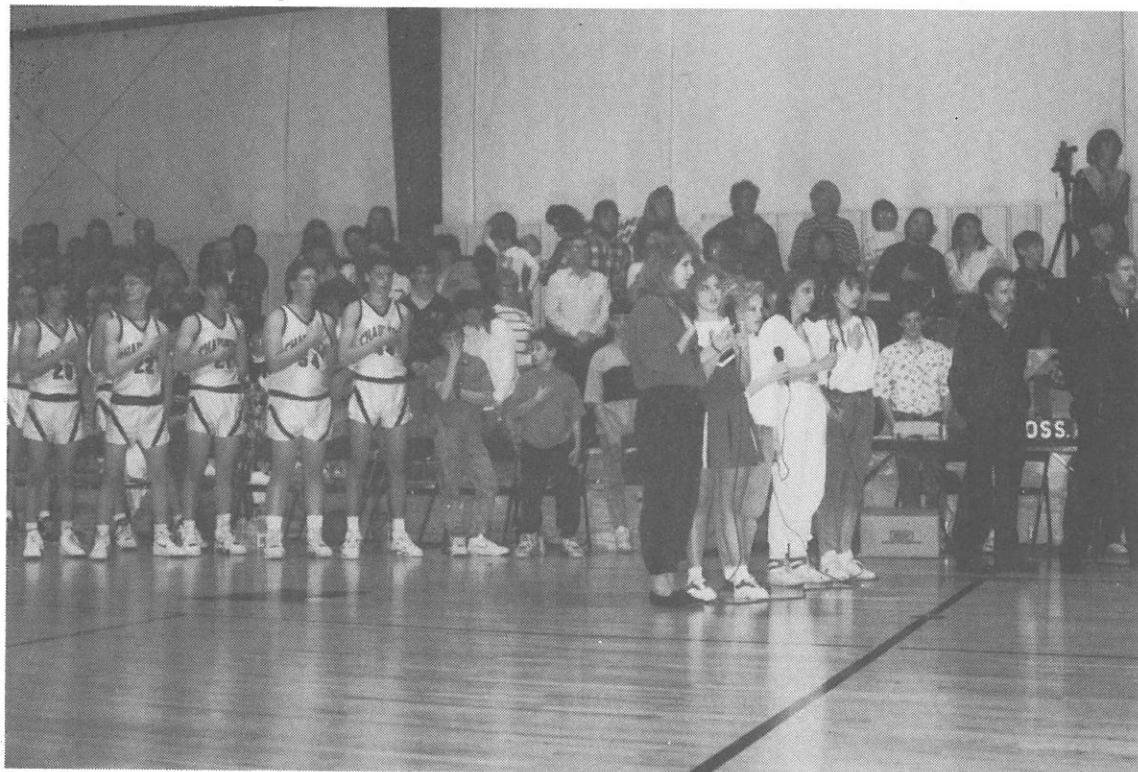

Chadwick Students Support Operation Desert Storm

The big news story that is affecting the world is the war in the Persian Gulf. Operation Desert Shield has become Operation Desert Storm.

People all over the country have renewed their patriotism in support of the troops and most everyone is affected, even at Chadwick.

Mrs. Snider-Gearing, a CHS teacher has mixed feelings about the war because her son is stationed in the Persian Gulf. She wants to support him and the other troops but doesn't want to support the war.

CHS alumni Chris Freese is in Saudi Arabia where he does testing on fighter jets in the Air Force. He says that he misses home and doesn't want to be there, but knows that its the job he was trained for.

The general business and typing I classes wrote letters to any soldier involved in the Persian Gulf war. None have received responses yet but they hope to.

Seventh grade, American, and Missouri history classes also wrote to any service person involved with the conflict. Several students have received responses to their letters. History teacher Mr. Long said that the responses were very appreciative of the support shown by the students.

Home Economics teacher Mrs. Morrill made all CHS students yellow ribbons to wear and Art teacher Mrs. Snider-Gearing made yellow ribbons with little American flags attached for all of the teachers.

Juniors Micky Walker and Tina Nalley both hope that the war ends quick and that everyone comes home soon. Tina also said that she hopes Saddam Hussein gets put in his place.

Most people here at Chadwick know somebody that is involved in the war whether a relative or friend and we all feel for them. Let's all hope for their fast and safe return.

Here is a letter that was received from 1989 Chadwick graduate, Chris Freese on February 11.

Mom,

19 Jan 91

It's the 3rd day of the war we have launched about seven attacks from here and all of our planes have come back. It seems as if I'm not actually in a war but today they gave the shop two M-16's so we can escort the locals to places. I heard a rumor that Israel is now in it, but rumors are running rampant here. I listened to Bush on the radio last night and he said what I felt all along, after the 1st day everyone was saying (some still are) that this would be a two week war but I know that it will last longer.

The days are long and mostly uneventful, we have the oil samples to burn when the jets get back but nothing else so we mostly sleep, write, or read. I have been teaching myself some card games and drawing a little.

The nights are a lot of the same except everyone has his own little rumor and has to tell it to everyone, most take the rumor as common knowledge then run to find someone to tell, kind of like home.

Nobody has gotten any mail for about a week, I guess it takes a while to get here, also they are holding packages somewhere to inspect them for anything illegal. Some guys are really bummed out about it (most are married) but I figure I'll get a letter sooner or later and when I do I'll be happy.

Yesterday we had two bunches of forty aircraft take off from here, each loaded with two 2 thousand pounders - that's 320,000 lbs somewhere in Iraq or Kuwait. They are going in again right about now (0700) with fifty-two and then again tonight, so there is a steady stream of aircraft going in. We sure do hope whenever they go out that they all come back. One lady in our shop went out to watch them go and started crying, then when they all came back she kissed each and every s.o.a.p. (Spectrometric, 011,

Analysis, Program) bottle that they brought in to us to welcome them back.

Well I'd better send this soon so I'll go. Take care, I love you.



Geography Bee

Chadwick students in grades 4-8 have participated in the National Geography Bee this last month. Each individual class had a contest to determine who would represent them in the oral competition with the rest of the classes. The competition between all the grades was held on February 4 in the gym. The representatives from the classes were as follows; Amanda Walker 4; Jim Fisher 4; Eric Smith 5; Megan Widner 5; Tyler Walker 6; Justin House 6; Daniel Dotson 7; Jeremiah Cummings 7; Travis Smith 8; and Matthew Lawrence.

There were prizes for the first two placings in the bee. Justin House received first prize which included a certificate, an inflatable globe, and a book from National Geographic. Justin, along with about 100 top scorers from each state took a written test and sent it in to see if he is eligible to compete in the state bee on April 5. He is now waiting to hear his results.

Matthew Lawrence took second place in the contest and received a map of the Soviet Union.

The bee was set up to motivate students to study and learn geography. It was developed in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the U.S.

The state winners and their teacher escorts will receive an all-expense-paid trip to Washington D.C. provided by the National Geographic Society and their co-sponsors. The first place national winner will receive a 25,000 college scholarship; the second place winner, a 15,000 scholarship; and the third place winner, a 10,000 scholarship.

In addition to the scholarships, winners will get acquainted with Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!" who will be moderating the finals.

Hopefully Justin and his teacher escort will be making that trip on May 22 and 23 and will come home to tell us all the good news from the contest. Good Luck Justin!!!

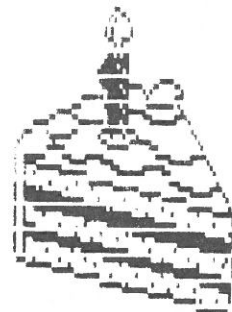

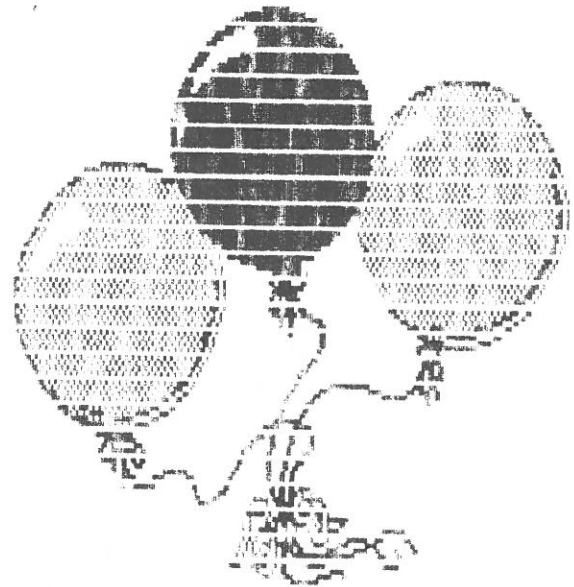

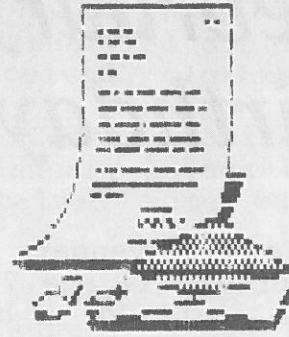
