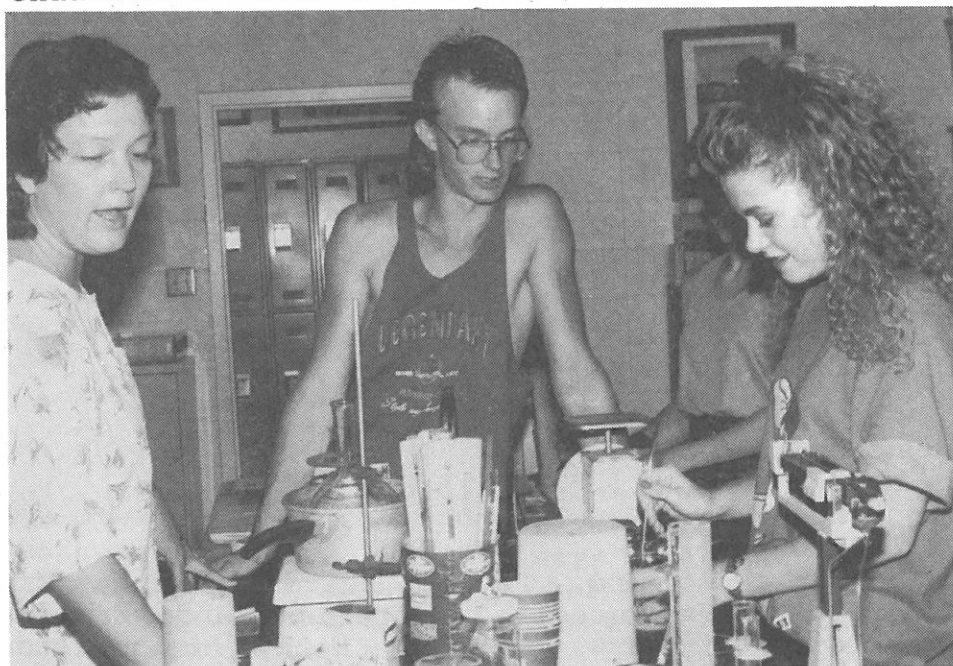

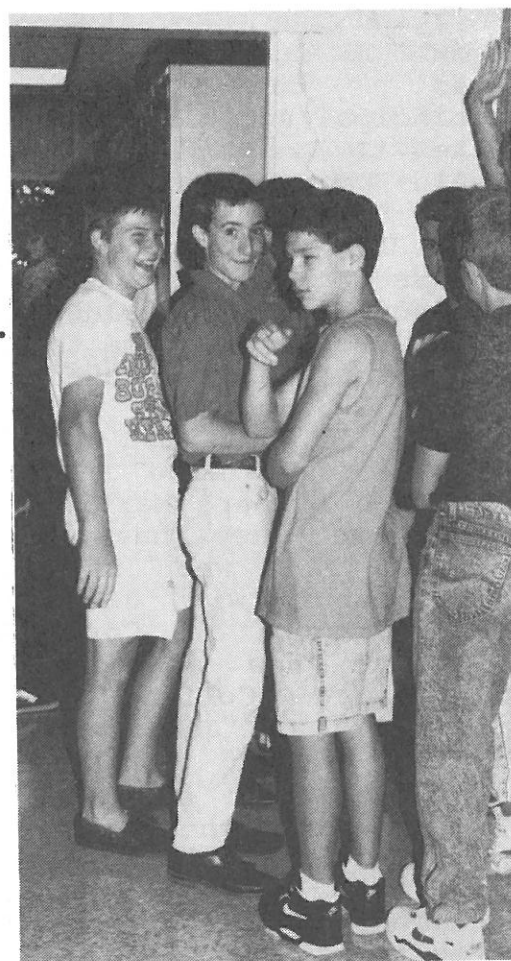

Chadwick School Welcomes New Superintendent

Dr. Jack Martin is the new superintendent of Chadwick R-1 School.

Dr. Martin was born in Harlan, Kentucky on August 27, 1947. He attended Evarts Kentucky Elementary School and graduated from New Chicago River Forest High School in Lake Station, Indiana.

Dr. Martin received his bachelors degree from Olivet Nazarene College in Illinois and his masters, specialist, and PhD from the University of Missouri at Columbia.

Dr. Martin was a carpenter for a few years after college then started teaching in 1976. His first teaching position was in Eolia, Missouri where he taught in Building Trades from 1976-1977. In 1978-80 he taught High School Industrial Arts/Social studies at Gilman City, Mo. From there he went to Cainsville, Mo. where he was the high school principal/social studies teacher, then to Sweetsprings, Mo. where he held the position of Middle and High School principal. In Wakenda, Mo. Dr. Martin remained for five years (1984-89). As a elementary principal/superintendent. The years before he came to Chadwick he was the Superintendent of North Davis R-3 School.

While busy with work Dr. Martin was also raising a family. He married Barbara Martin in 1967 and together they have 5 children. Rudy (22) who is resided in Warrensburg with his wife Beverly and 9 month old Cara, Tonya (18) who is now attending Southwest Baptist College, April(14), Sara(9), and Jennifer (7) who all three attend Chadwick school.

Dr. Martin has many ideas and hopes for the Chadwick school district. The main issue right now is the proposal to add 7 new elementary classrooms and a new restroom facility as well as remodel the old restrooms. It's going to cost about \$150,000 with a

levy increase of \$.25. It will be going before the public on October 8 on the ballot.

Higher expectations for the students to learn more and the teachers to teach more is also in Dr. Martins agenda. A new attendance policy was adopted September 12, 1991 to stress the importance of attendance and being on time.

Dr. Martin says our biggest problem right now is the three budget cuts which adds up to \$86,000 or 10% of our budget. Two of the cuts were due to money shortfalls and the third with Kansas city district using \$70,000,000 for the desegregation.

Speaking on behalf of Chadwick, I would like to extend a hearty welcome to Dr. Martin and his family to the area.

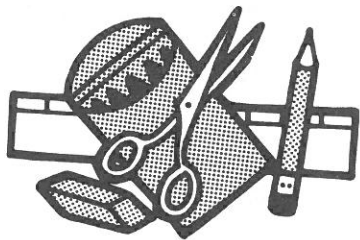

A favorite subject of Cody's and Tiffany's is math.

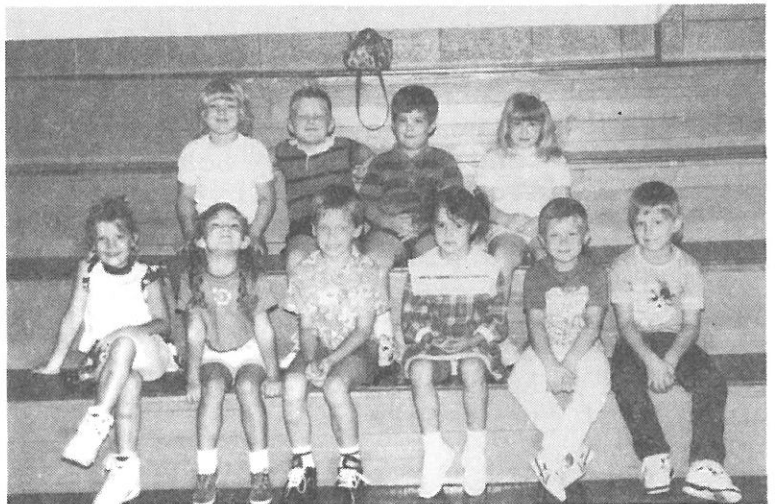

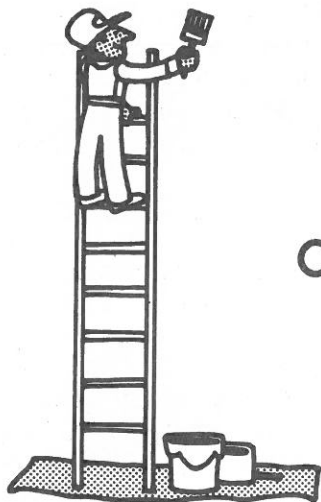

"FOR THE KIDS"

Our children need and deserve new elementary classrooms. This year's sixth grade is in the same half trailer for the third year. We have two elementary classes, two special education classrooms, and a remedial reading classroom housed in temporary trailer units. Our children are the future and deserve every advantage we can provide them.

The Building Bond on the 1976 high school addition was retired in March of this year which reduces the Debt Service Levy by 50 cents. A new elementary building, replacing the trailers, can be constructed for \$150,000.00, give or take 10% depending on construction cost at time of construction. A fifteen year lease purchase of \$150,000.00 requires a levy increase of 52 cents with and additional 23 cents set aside to cover furnishings, equipment, and extra operating expenses. Of the entire 75 cents necessary, 50 cents would be covered by the reduction on the 1976 Debt Service Levy, leaving a net levy increase of 25 cents.

The tax increase for the average tax-payer would be less than 75 cents per month or \$9.00 per year.

Plans are to construct seven elementary classrooms, and two elementary restrooms. Also, the restrooms in the existing building would be remodeled to better serve the Jr.-Sr. high school population. The new building would be 100' X 60' with classrooms designed for enrollments of 25 students each.

The special education and remedial classrooms would then be housed in the current first through fourth grade classrooms. Every room would be occupied and is desperately needed.
