

President George Washington proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving Day on November 26 in 1789. Then in 1863, President Abraham Lincoln made Thanksgiving an annual holiday to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. When Franklin D. Roosevelt became President he set Thanksgiving one week earlier. He wanted to help business by lengthening the shopping period before Christmas. But it was returned to the fourth November Thursday by Congress in 1941.

7 Cherries


Mix it all. Put it in the oven at 300 degrees for 30 minutes.

## ART NEWS



# DEER SEASON



# What is Student Council?

Student Council... a group of dogooders who dutifully hold fundraisers and volunteer to help with all activities... NO!! Student Council is about POWER! Power to extend the time for lunch hour. Power to set up a homecoming dance.. Power to get a salad bar put into the lunch room.

Student Council works closely with the administration and with the school board members to upgrade curriculum, set up certain student benefits, etc. Some student government activities include such things as sponsoring scholarship and award programs, coordinating student activities, and organizing assembly programs, conferences, lectures, and other cultural events. Student council can do many more things such as fight for students' rights, manage student services such as cafeterias and health centers, and organize community projects and travel programs.

Student government is made up of an executive committee (including President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Parliamentarian) as well as the rest of the council. Sometimes each Homeroom has a representative on the council. Commissions are set up to be in charge of certain responsibilities. For example, a social commission may be set up (of about 3 people) to plan and organize the social events of the year.

To be elected as an officer in most schools you have to have a required G.P.A., a platform (plan) that has to be approved, and they usually give a short speech telling of their qualifications and plans while in office at an assembly.

Student government can really benefit your school if started and carried out. Money raised is put back into the school system or used to pay for speakers, etc. Students are sometimes advised as to how to spend the money but for the most part it is the students decision.

Rogersville set up a student council about 8 years ago. Since then it has grown from a very small group to a group of about 60 students. They now run on a \$25,000-\$30,000 budget. They raise most of their money from concession stands, selling such items as T-shirts and going to area businesses asking for donations. Some activities they sponsor are Project Graduation, Right Life Week, where they have workshops over different subjects, and they really make Homecoming a festive event.

Most high schools in the U.S. have student governments, so why doesn't Chadwick? Lack of knowledge about it perhaps? Well I asked some CHS students what they thought about a student council and here are their responses: Tonya Rozell said that she really likes the idea of getting one here in Chadwick. Christal Gilbert and April Martin both said that it sounds "good". Tonya Putman and Tessa Nalley thought we should have it and it would be good for the school. We need one desperately was Terry Mitchells quick response. Stefanie Weter and Kathy Applegate both agreed that students deserved the right to have their ideas and opinions recognized. The majority of the people I talked to were interested in what it could do for our school and learning more about how a student council is organized. Hopefully we will learn a lot about how to start one here in Chadwick. Who knows, maybe we will have one before the end of this year!

Mrs Horton was a paper boy.



Cheryl Burkhardt and Julie Coffey were clowns.

Sam Winn was selected as the architect to design the building and draw bidding specifications. That is expected to take 4-6 weeks.

McLiney and Company is going to handle finances through Sparta bank.

We hope to have the building completed by the beginning of the school year in 1992. Depending on estimates of construction time, it may be necessary to move classes housed in the trailers into temporary classrooms throughout the building and begin construction in March, April, or May.
