

Lady Cardinals...



Sleep

Hardly anyone gets enough sleep. Experts say, in your lifetime, you'll probably sleep about 220,000 hours. But, where are we when we're sleeping? And does our consciousness go? In some cultures, sleep is considered an avenue to another world, and a time when the body recharges and the

spirit departs.

When we are all in our peaceful slumbers, we go through the four stages of sleep. First, you enter sleep, which one categorized by the brain waves that are slower than when you're awake, and which passes quickly. If you are awaken from this stage of sleep, you won't always realize that you were asleep. When your brain waves show a sharp spike of activity, you've entered stage two sleep. About half your sleep is spent in this stage, and although you experience drifting thoughts while you're in it, because they aren't visual, they're not dreams. The third and fourth stages of sleep are referred to as Delta You spend about 20% of sleep. sleep in this stage, when your brain waves slow down and you're dead to the world. From Delta sleep you usually reenter stage two sleep, and from there you enter REM (Rapid Eye Movement) sleep. During REM sleep, your eyes move rapidly under their lids, your heart rate and breathing become erratic, and your brain is very active. This is when dream. Your brain waves stop sending signals to your spinal cord during REM sleep, which essentially paralyzes you and keeps you from acting out your dreams. REM sleep marks the end of each ninety-minute sleep cycle, and you usually go through four or five of them a night.

So now that everyone knows what they go through when they sleep, I hope everyone has sweet dreams!!

Sleeping Habits

The average person spends 24 years sleeping during their life. Sleeping habits vary from person to person but most people do get enough sleep. It is recommended that an adult get 8 hours per night. and the Family Leave Bill.


Mark Loveland commented, "He must not have done anything, and if he did it must not have been very important because I sure did not hear about it".



Doug participated in the parade, Then he attended the ceremony. After the ceremony the students went to talk to the governor.


If given the chance to talk to the governor, Doug said he would ask him to save the school.

How To Help With Homework

According to the 1986 U.S. Department of Education report What Works: Research about Teaching and Learning, students who do homework regularly achieve more in school. Students of average ability who do three to five hours of homework a week, for example, usually earn the same grades as students of high ability who don't do homework.

Homework teaches students skills they need to become successful, independent, motivated adults. In addition to reinforcing topics covered in class, homework teaches students to follow directions, work on their won, begin and complete tasks, manage time and work to their full potential. Homework also helps students realize they are responsible for their own learning.

You can have a positive, day to day impact on your child's education by helping with homework. Here are some tips:

- 1. Tell your child that you want her to succeed in school. Make sure she understands that homework isn't an option, whether the assignment is dull, easy or difficult. If you or your child have questions about assignments, don't be afraid to raise them with teachers or the principal.
- 2. Emphasize the value of homework by showing your child that you consider the subject he is studying to be important. Help him understand that schoolwork is preparation for the future.
- 3. Make sure homework gets done first. Set clear rules such as, "No TV or phone calls until your homework is finished."
- 4. To avoid a mad rush in the morning, teach your child to organize homework in a backpack or school bag before bedtime.
- 5. If your child forgets to bring homework home, consider asking his teachers to write a log of wee! The assignments.
