

Easy Wreath Cookies

1 roll refrigerated sugar cookies Red and green colored sugar Red cinnamon candies, Multicolored sugar Coated chocolate candies

Roll dough into 1/4 inch thick slices. Roll each into a ball. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Flatten with a glass that has been greased and dipped in sugar. Sprinkle with colored sugar. Gently press candies around edge. Bake in preheated oven at 350 degrees 9 to 11 minutes or until light golden brown. Remove whole cookies, cool on rack, and separate. Makes 36.

The Christmas Tree Legend

St. Winfrid, according to legend, said of the little fir tree: "This little tree, a young child of the forest, shall be your holy tree. It is the wood of peace, for your houses are built of the fir. Let this be called the tree of the Christ-child." So the Christmas tree or evergreen tree, is indicative of Eternal Life and so is symbolic of the meaning of Christmas.

Christmas trees originated in Rome and appeared in Germany about 1605. Introduced into the Court of St. James about 1840 by Prince Consort of Saxe-Cobury, and the custom spread rapidly among the aristocratic families of London, and was almost immediately adopted by all classes throughout England.




Teachers Attend Conference



Great American Smokeout November 18

Oral Cancer Epidemic Predicted

Today 75% of mouth and throat cancers result from smoking and use of smokeless tobacco. Health care officials warn that if use of smokeless tobacco does not slow, we will experience an epidemic of oral cancer in 20 to 30 years. estimated 10 to 16 Americans use smokeless tobacco. Nearly 20% of male high school students use it and they are often the prime targets of advertising campaigns for smokeless tobacco products.

Tobacco Smoke a Toxic Substance

A report by the EPA in January concludes that second-hand smoke is a toxic substance, placing it in the same category as asbestos. Second-hand smoke (ETS) responsible for about 3,000 lung cancer deaths each year. Other reports have shown that ETS is responsible for approximately 50,000 deaths each year in the United States, including about 37,000 heart disease deaths and over 12,000 deaths due to cervical and other cancers.

Some of the EPA's findings concerning the effects of ETS on children are as follows: 150,000 to 300,000 cases of pneumonia and bronchitis annually in children up to 18 months of age are attributable to exposure to second-hand smoke.


We are all exicted about having an Art Club this year and we hope it turns out successful hopefully we will have an Art Club at Chadwick School for years to come.



FBLA NEWS



Fifth Grade Gossip



Teamwork

Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Humanities, Physical Education, Citizenship, Values... TEAMWORK. As I consider those concepts which feel are mandatory in education of all students, this word comes to mind. But, what does it mean? It is a word most often associated with athletics. As you compare the winning team to the losing team, the difference can often be attributed to how well the members work together. Yes, it helps to have an outstanding worldclass athlete, but is that enough to have a successful team? Well, the purpose of this article is not to discuss the ingredients of a athletic successful program. Instead, I would like to define the word TEAMWORK and draw conclusions on how we can work together as a team to educate the students of this community.

I had the opportunity to visit the sixth grade class last week as they learned about compound words. TEAMWORK is an excellent example of a compound word. Therefore, to define TEAMWORK I would like to first define the two words that

make up the work. The word TEAM is defined by Webster as a "group of people working or playing together, especially as one side in contest". This definition reminds me of an important factor. To be a TEAM we must work together to accomplish the same goal. raises a question: What is our goal at Chadwick School? Is it to entertain, amuse, pacify or to educate? If all the members of our team -- parents, students and staff-- do not have the same goal, we are not a TEAM.

The second part of our compound word is WORK. Webster defines work as "bodily or mental effort exerted to do or make something". The key work of that definition is the work "effort". I'm afraid that to many students come to school daily with no intention of exerting themselves to learn. As a result, teachers spend a great amount of time trying to motivate these students to become a positive member of the team.

Alright, I've demonstrated my dictionary skills for the day, but, what am I trying to say? First, if qoal is to educate all students, then the members of our educational team must stand up and be counted. Parents, if you do not accept your responsibility to work with us then we will always be one player short. What a disadvantage! Students, if you will recognize that we are here to work with you, we can accomplish great things. We need you working with us, not against us. Second, it important that we recognize that school is work. Hopefully, there times when this work enjoyable and challenging. However, there may be other times when school is dull unmotivating. It is during these times that students must work that much harder to grasp the concepts being taught. TEAMWORK--those eight letters carry a lot meaning. I hope we can rise-up to the challenge of working together as a team to educate all students and encourage them to always be their best and perform to their highest level of ability.
