

for that special evening.

Girls must deal with the hectic shopping and decision making of finding the perfect dress that fits and looks great. That perfect dress can cost anywhere from \$60 -\$300, just for the dress. There are many places to look for a dress: The Closet, Vanity, Jean Nicole, and Merry-Go-Round are just a few of the many places. After the decision on the dress has been made next comes the shoes. Shoes can cost anywhere from \$20 - \$45 depending on the style of the shoe and whether they are dyed to match the dress. Now the hard decisions are over, but everything is not finished yet. Decisions on accessories: Hair style, gloves, jewelry, and etc, must be made, which may cost another \$50 - \$60. Mrs. Goin would send somebody to get Mrs. Smith and when she would start to take the picture it would fly away. It did that every time.


One day the cardinal came and Mrs. Goin sent a person to get Mrs. Smith and when she came she finally got some pictures.

"You don't have to act like you think you're better than they are. Just try to lead them away from it. And if they won't follow you, just go your own way."


Manuel had seen it all, and he knew what he was talking about.

"Sometimes you need to talk out things that are bothering you. Do it. Don't turn to drugs. Talk to your parents or a good friend or a teacher you like and trust. They can help."

"Drugs can't help anybody. They don't make problems go away. They ruin your health, change your feelings and put you in dangerous situations. So why start? Don't even try them."

#### GUIDELINES FOR PARENTS/PROFESSIONALS

- 1. Increase your awareness of the role drug use plays in your own life. Become familiar with how your personal values and attitudes on this subject impact your judgement of the drug-using behavior of other people.
- 2. Keep in mind that we live in a drug-conscious society and that most people use a variety of moodaltering drugs throughout their lifetime for social and medical purposes.
- 3. Know as much as you can about different kinds of drugs or where to obtain this information before your children ask.
- 4. Communicate openly and honestly with your children about drug use rather than moralizing or lecturing about the dangers of drugs. Try to create a caring and sharing atmosphere within your home.
- 5. Remember that it is never too early to do drug education with your children and never too late to become educated yorself.
- 6. When establishing rules about drug use, be sure and explain to your children how your personal values, attitudes and experiences with drugs form the basis of your position on this subject.
- 1. If you discover your child is currently using or has used drugs, don't bother asking he/she WHY he/she did it. The reason is always because they wanted to feel good or better. This is the universal motive behind everyone's drug use.
- 2. If your children break the rules you set concerning drug use, be sure the consequences of their actions are understood before they act. These consequences should be unnegotiable. It's better to have no stated consequences than ones you set but fail to carry out.
- 3. Do not stand between your children and the natural consequences of their drug using behavior.
- 4. Reactions resulting from your own panic, fear or anger will only inhibit communication between you and your child. Take a walk, then
- 5. Try to maintain a perspective on the total life situation of your child, not only their drug-using behaviors. This is the best barometer for the indication of the problem.
