# Espanol

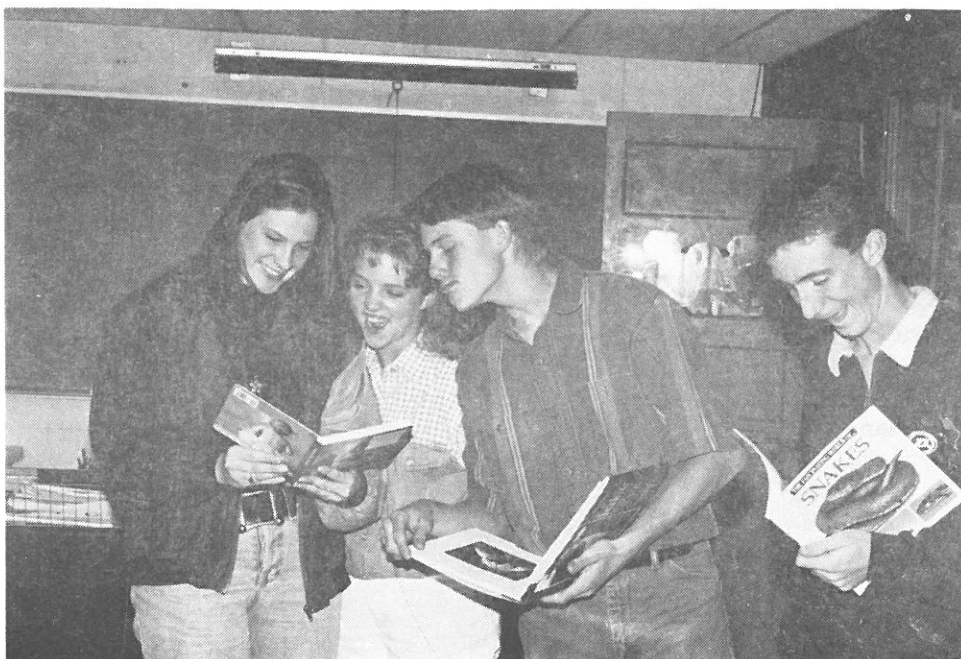

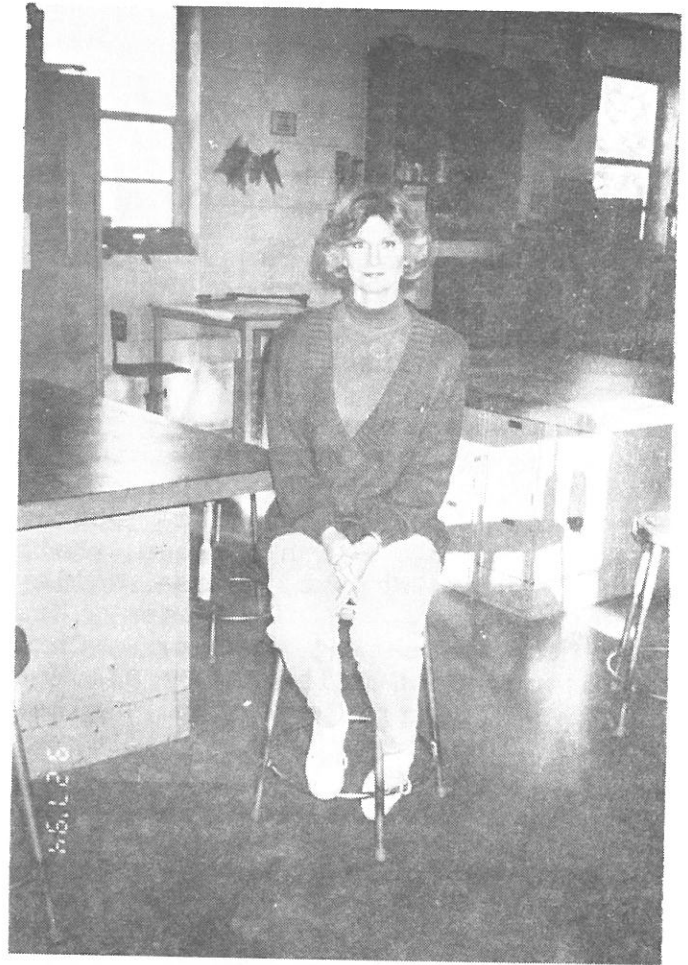
Although this is his first year as a full time teacher, he has enjoyed his first few weeks here. The more he gets to know the other teachers and students the more he likes it.



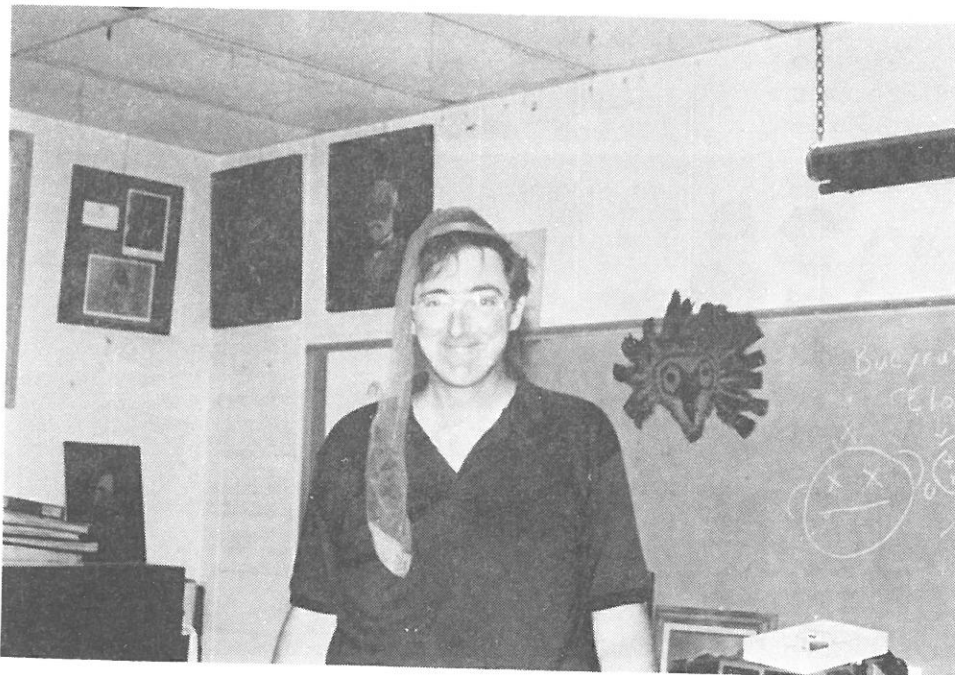

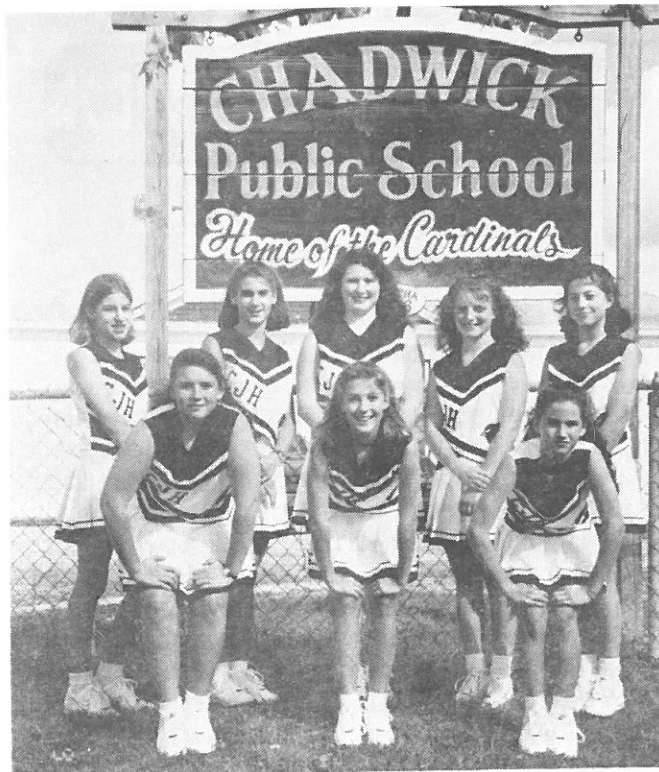
Some of the players were asked to give a comment on the season.

"We are not doing as good as we all hoped we would, even though we are doing better than we were at the first of the season." Rintha Goin

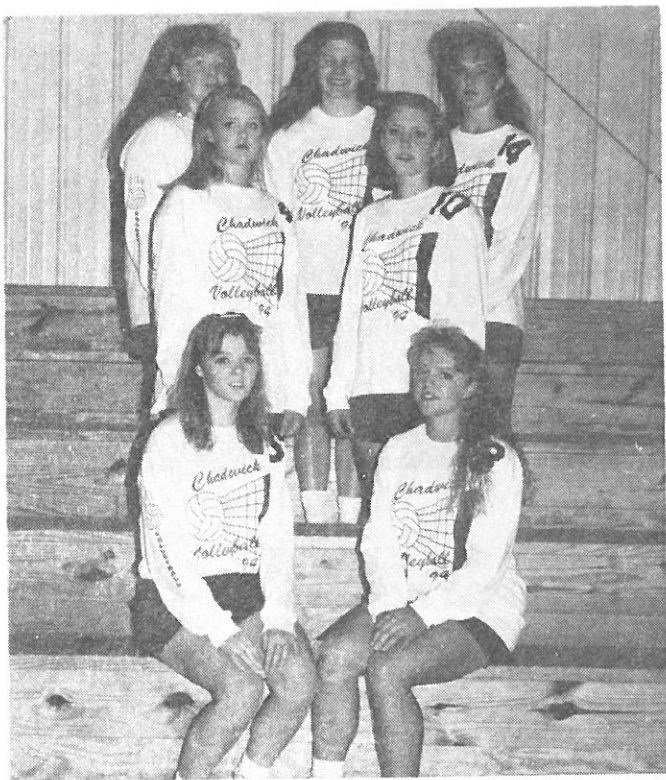

They are sponsored by Kimberly Potter.



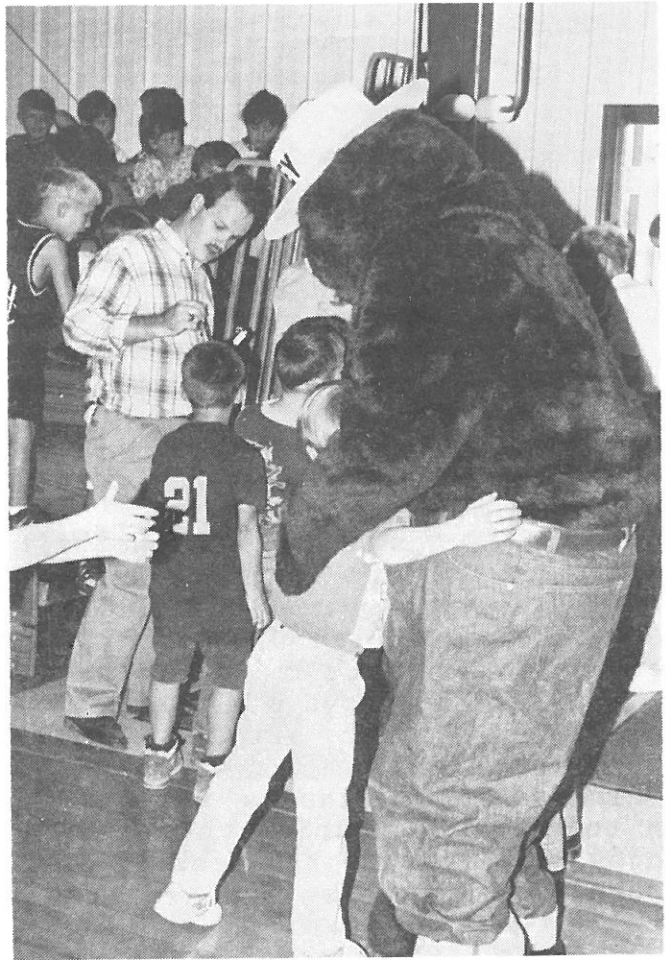
# Smokey The Bear Visits Chadwick

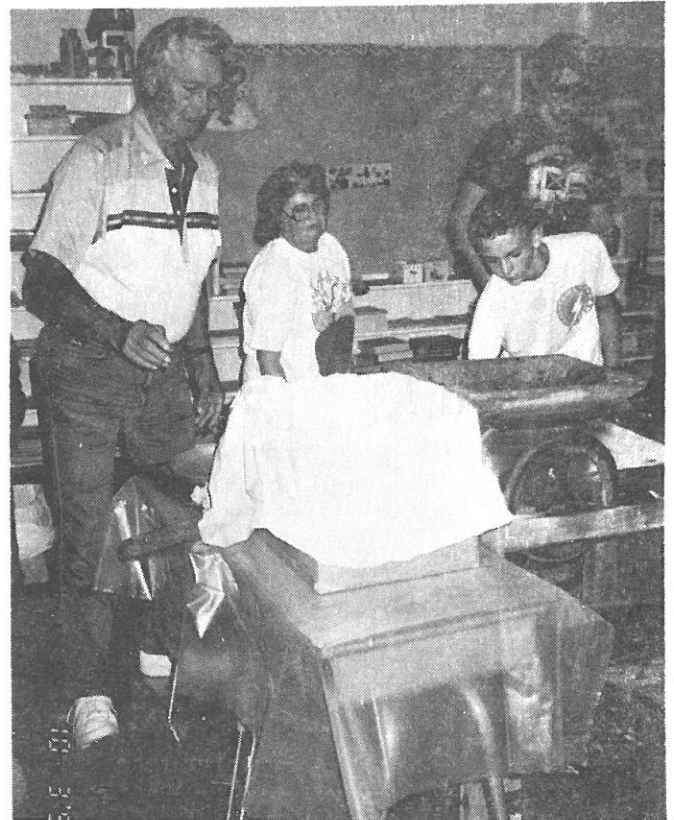
# Cider Sippin'

The Cider Mill has been passed down 4 generations, approximately 150 years. They have been making this cider for 25 years, but they do not sell it to the public.
