CHS DOWNS BRADLEYVILLE IN HOMECOMING GAME



Warm Weather Brings MMATs to Chadwick

With the coming of spring also comes the annual Missouri Mastery Achievement Test (MMAT) at Chadwick School. The MMAT will be accompanied by the Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) test this year.

"The MMAT will be completely phased out of the public school system in Missouri by 2002, they will be replaced by the MAP and the Stanford Nine test. The major difference in the MMAT and the MAP test is the MAP test application. Students must be able to apply information," said counselor Mr. Stewart.

The MAP was introduced last year in science. This year the MAP will test science, communication arts, and mathematics. This will be last year the MMAT will test science. In communication arts and mathematics, the year 2000 will be the last year for the MMAT. In 2002, the MMAT will be completely phased out with the last year only testing in social studies.

This year students in grades kindergarten through tenth grade will take the MMAT. In addition students in grades third, fourth, seventh, eighth, tenth, and eleventh will be tested with the MAP test.

"They stress me out, and I get real nervous," said freshman Teresa Villarreal.

"It is a good way justify jobs at the Department of Education. Until we hold students accountable the results are worthless," said teacher Mr. Long.

Some high school students have already taken portions of the MMAT test to coincide with classes they were taking first semester. The MMAT test and the MAP test are scheduled to take place sometime between the middle of April and the middle of May.





Boys Finish Season With Winning Record of 15-12



Highlights for the Lady Cardinals this season were winning the Norwood Tournament and capturing the Mark Twain Conference title. The girls also won 21 games this year. This year, the girls won more games than any other girls team at Chadwick School has ever won.
