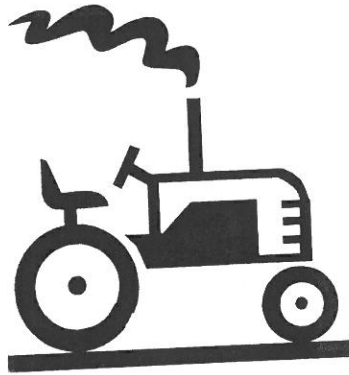
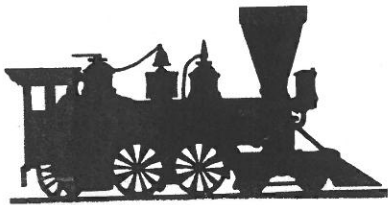

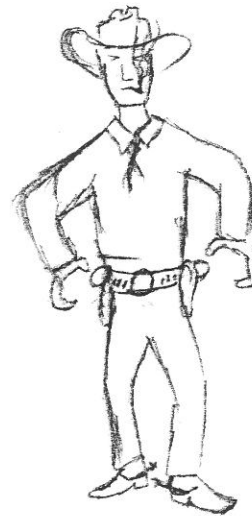
Choo-Choo: There Goes

The last year it ran was in 1932 because people then began getting vehicles or had neighbors with vehicles so they had a different way to get places. The tracks were taken out in 1934. Even though the train is gone people can still celebrate the Chadwick Flyer on Railroad Day.

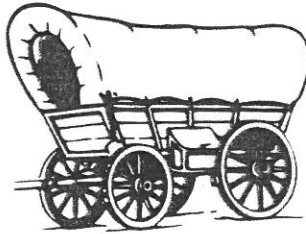
Sometime later all the Knobber's were to be hanged. They all are buried somewhere in the Chadwick/Oldfield area.

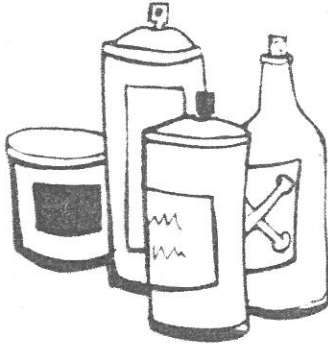

The class will be leaving early that morning at 6:00 a.m. and will be returning around 8:00 or 9:00 p.m.

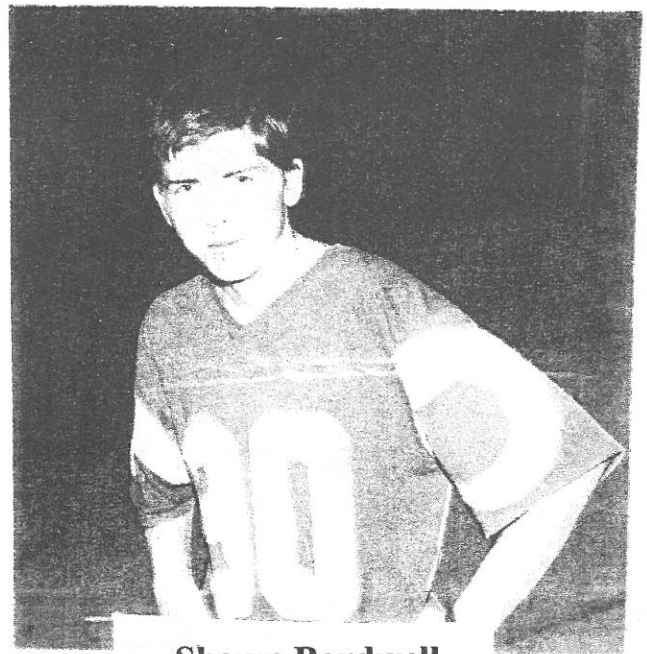

One of our most senior teachers has decided that after 31 years she will retire. Mrs. Avaline Harris has been with the Chadwick School District since 1968.

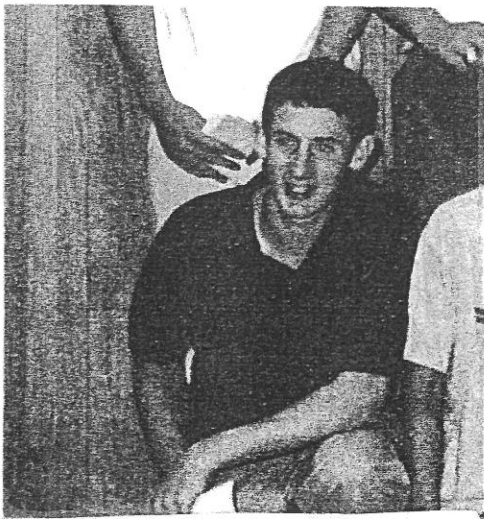

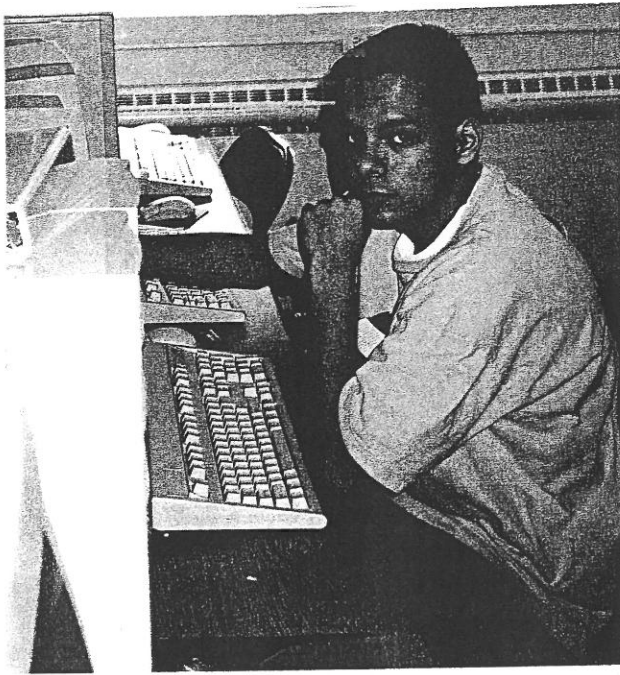
