During the Board of Education meeting on April 28, 2003, Chris and Tim from the architectural firm of Butler, Rosenberg and Partners presented preliminary plans for the renovation and addition to the existing buildings. The Board of Education approved these preliminary plans and the architectural firm will be finalizing them. The architects anticipate having the plans completed for bidding with construction beginning the first week of August.

The preliminary plans are now available for review by the community. We would encourage the patrons of the district to stop by and see these plans and make any comments or suggestions.

Because of the renovation to the building, we will face some challenges. For the safety of the students during this phase, some temporary classroom locations will be used throughout the project. While this is unfortunate, it is necessary since it would not be possible to complete this project while the students are not in session. During this first phase of the construction, the 1925 building will be renovated and the new library media center will be completed.

The second phase of the construction will be the addition of a new cafeteria, kitchen, four additional classrooms, and restrooms. When the project is completed, we will have accomplished both modernization to the existing buildings and the addition of some much needed space.

Mr. Long said, "Jessica is a good student: she has excellent attendance, gives her best effort, and has a very pleasant attitude."

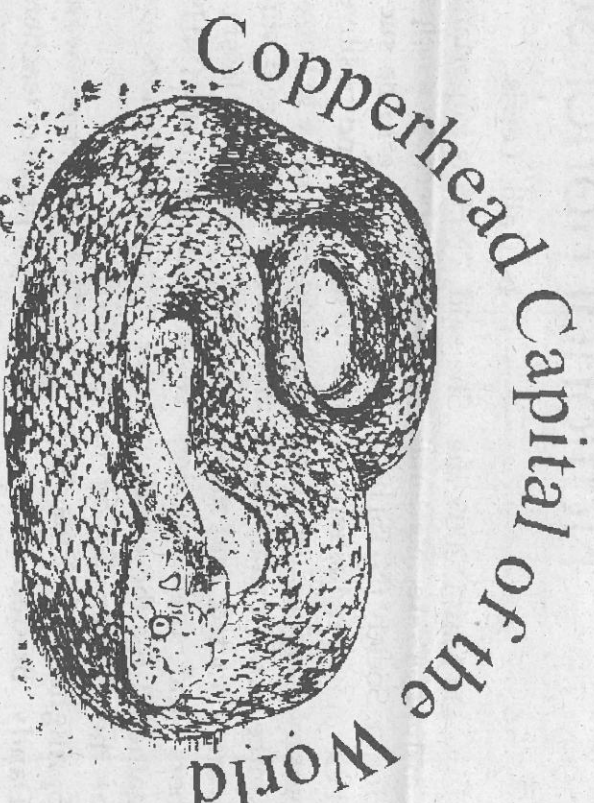
## Is Chadwick the Copperhead Capital of the World?

In July of 1965, many venomous snakes from a revival attracted as many as 200 snakes to the Pine Ridge Church over a period of several days. The phenomenon made headlines as far away as St. Louis.

Residents began referring to Chadwick as the Copperhead Capital of the World, and they held annual "bring-'em-back-alive" snake hunts in conjunction with a barbecue and contest for the biggest snake. The snakes were then placed in a huge metal drum and transported to Silver Dollar City where they were milked for their

venom. The snake hunts were eventually ended by the Missouri Department of Conservation. Mrs. Marie Day said, "The Conservation Department put a stop to the hunts, because copperheads were in danger of becoming endangered in the area." Former Missouri Conservation Agent Don Long, who was responsible for enforcing the end of the hunts in the late seventies, said, "The only snakes that can be legally captured are those that are damaging property or presenting a physical threat."

## DID YOU KNOW?

-80% of venomous snake bites occur when humans are attempting to catch or kill a snake.

-40% of venomous snake bites occur when the bite victim has consumed alcohol.

-Missouri has over 50 species of snakes, but only 5 of those species are venomous.

-The 5 venomous species are the Osage Copperhead, the Western Cottonmouth, Massasauga Rattlesnake, Western Pygmy Rattlesnake, and the Timber Rattlesnake.
