# Virus Report

Computer viruses, adware, and spyware are major concerns for anyone using the Internet, especially school districts which often maintain networks of hundreds of computers.

There are over a hundred thousand known computer virus strains, which cause over \$30 billion of damage annually. Two of the most common types of viruses include worms and Trojan horses.

Worms are viruses that replicate inside a computer without the user's knowledge and continue to eat up resources, slowing down the computer until eventually the problem is noticed.

A Trojan horse is a destructive program that masquerades as a benign program. Some Trojan horse viruses even appear to be antivirus applications, although they are actually introducing viruses to the system.

Often adware and spyware can be just as harmful as a virus, with students unknowingly installing programs that can flood a computer with pop-up ads, cookies, or data mining software, all of which consume a computer's resources. Programs such as Adaware and Spybot Search and Destroy may help locate and remove such programs.

The first step to protecting any PC is investing in a reliable antivirus program. This will generally protect your computer from harm by singling out a virus and deleting it if possible. In addition, setting up a firewall will protect your computer, not only from viruses, but also from computer hackers as



### How to Prep for the ACT

Taking the ACT is a must for college bound juniors and seniors, but how can you be sure to succeed? Jake Schwartz offers the following tips:

Tip #1: Take it early and take it often, You should take the test at least once your junior year and twice your senior year. This gives you a chance to become familiar with the test and improve your score. Remember, only the best score counts—low scores will not be held against you!

Tip #2: When taking the test, read everything carefully, including the directions and questions. Tip #3: Time management is key. Answer the easiest questions first, and

save the hardest for last. That way, if you have to guess, it is on a question that you were likely to miss anyway, Tip #4: Use logic on the hard questions, Eliminate all of the obviously wrong answers, and then make an educated guess. (1t's multiple choice, so

there's a 25% chance you will get the right answer.) Tip #5: Get your hands on a good study guide. Many companies provide

books that help you brush up on your ACT skills. Computer programs are often included with the text or can be purchased separately.

Tip #6: Get plenty of rest.

Tip #7: Eat a good breakfast.

Tip #8: Find a test buddy. Register for the same test date and location as someone else and make regular study dates to prepare for the test. Tip #9: Get a practice test. Mr. Cataldo has copies in his office.

## Conservation Corner

A closer look at trapping and the controversy surrounding it.

Despite a national decline in the somewhat controversial practice of trapping, an increasing number of local outdoorsmen are choosing to pass the time between other hunting seasons by setting traps for game.

According to a 1995 Gallop poll, 63% of Missourians approved of humane and well-regulated trapping, which means that 37% disapproved of or were undecided about the practice. Animal rights organizations, like People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), argue that trapping is inhumane. Not only is the common method of killing trapped game by striking the animal across the base of the nose with a club offensive to many opponents of trapping, but they also point out that animals caught in the traps may suffer from frostbite or shock, be attacked by other predators, or injure themselves trying to escape. In addition, dogs, cats, birds, and other non-target animals are often inadvertently crippled or killed by traps.

However, according to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), trapping is an important part of keeping species populations at healthy levels, and the MDC carefully regulates trapping in order to minimize collateral damage done by traps. MDC officials assert that to make trapping as humane as possible, trappers should check all traps often. Missouri law requires that trappers check their traps every 24 or 48 hours, depending on the type of trap.

# Virus Report (cont'd)

District Technology Coordinator Ms. Gail Ellis advises, "One of the best ways to fight viruses is to make sure that you are current on all of your Windows updates." Staying current not only fixes bugs in various programs, it helps Windows programs identify and quarantine the latest viruses.

The faculty at Chadwick School is responsible for keeping the computers up to date, and Chadwick School's network is already protected by AVG and Sonicwall Filter, but viruses and other harmful programs can still affect computers if users do not follow the basic rules set forth by the district.

The Chadwick School policy for computer use, which all students are required to sign before using the computers, lists 17 reasons that students can lose computer privileges. Number 13 states that "no user is allowed to download, and/or install any software or games to any computers." This policy is in place partially because the majority of games on the Internet lack definite educational value, but also because sites that offer free games, music, or other high traffic content may make their money by data mining or surreptitiously installing adware or other programs.

Number 15 and Number 17 on the list are identical, perhaps for emphasis, and state that "installing software without prior approval of the district technology coordinator or system administrator" will cause students to lose privileges.

Number 16 restricts the use of personal e-mail, which can be one of the quickest modes of spreading viruses. Most email servers scan potentially dangerous attachments, but this is never foolproof. Email attachments from strangers should never be opened, and even if the email is from a trusted source, unexpected attachments should not be opened because some viruses work by hijacking an infected user's address book and sending email without his or her consent. The best policy is to simply contact the person who sent you the email and ask if they intended to send an attachment.

### **Thomas's Trapping Tips**

### Tip #1: Location Location Location

When choosing a location for traps, look for areas where trails come together, like where an old logging trail intersects with the perimeter of a field, because that is where most game is going to travel. Avoid public roadways and areas where domestic animals or small children might be present.

### #2 Bait and Switch

The right bait is essential to snaring game. Many trappers say the best bait is dead cow, but others have found success with ground mice, The Three Meat, turkey, and Catmandew. Try a variety of baits to see which works best.

### #3 Follow the Law

Don't forfeit your eligibility in all your favorite seasons by not playing by the rules when trapping.

### #4 It's an Investment

For some beginners, the cost of permits and traps may present a barrier. Some steel traps can cost as much as \$80 and may set for weeks or months without catching any game. Target the game with furs that bring the most money, including bobcats at \$40-80, coyotes at \$20-40, and foxes at \$15-20.

### #5 Check Your Traps Often

Checking the traps daily (or every 48 hours, depending on the type of trap) is not only the law, it will prevent you from losing valuable furs to predators, trap-hoppers (other trappers who rob your traps), or missed opportunities. Remember, if the trap is full, it can't catch any more game!

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
